Strategic Plan Goal: Goal 2: Environmental Sustainability

Background/Justification:

The City Code, in several chapters and sub-sections, strictly limits the allowable height of grass to not be more than one (1) foot, and prohibits brush, briars, etc. on both residential and commercial properties and adjacent rights of way. {See 125-10(J), 141-8, and 157-5(B)(1)(a)[11][a]}.

Code Enforcement Officers are limited in allowed discretion, and horticultural knowledge, to interpret the Code as it is written to accommodate the growing trend to cultivate and manage naturalized landscaping.

Public Works Assistant Director Brenda Alexander (DPW-AD) researched practices by other municipalities which allow the cultivation of natural landscaping. Discussion and review of various sample naturalized landscapes was conducted by Council at the February 20, 2018 worksession. DPW-AD Alexander and Public Services Director Ryan attended meetings of the City's Tree and Landscape Board (TLB). Their discussions revealed that Naturalized, Native or Managed Landscapes, as they are commonly referred to, are becoming more common and desired, and create the need to revise existing nuisance or property maintenance ordinances to better serve our residents who wish to provide such natural landscaping and habitat on their properties.

The TLB advised that any new ordinance standards/requirements should allow for ease of understanding and enforcement by Code Enforcement Officers. The attached proposed amendments to the City Code have been discussed with and vetted by the TLB. The proposed amendments would have the effect of expanding City code standards and allowing greater flexibility for residents who wish to have more naturalized properties.

The following information reflects much of the advice regarding legislative intent provided by the TLB:

Naturalized, native or managed landscapes often include plant species which self-seed or which otherwise propagate themselves without anyone 'planting them'. In some cases, plant species which might be known and intentionally managed by a property owner may not be widely recognized as cultivated, and many such 'wild' plant species are not native to Maryland.

For example, the wild native grass Broomsedge and many wild native plants in the Aster family are native to Maryland and are well adapted to management as part of a naturalized landscape. In such cases, the individual plants may not necessarily be intentionally planted, even though their ongoing management is intentional.

Likewise, many introduced plant species such as Common Violet, Buttercup, White Clover, Dandelion etc. are often identified as weeds and are seldom available for purchase or 'planting'. However, these

species are appropriate and often found within areas that would properly be identified as a naturalized or managed landscape.

The growth of Dandelions, Broomsedge, etc. should not by itself be considered a 'state of neglect' since these species provide important benefits in a naturalized landscape and also because these plants are not hazardous and are easily managed through the intentional care of a property owner in the normal course of yard maintenance.

However, the rampant growth of certain notorious and aggressively spreading invasive weeds such as Mile-a-Minute, Oriental Bittersweet, Canada Thistle and others are not adapted to management and the rampant growth of such plants might be considered as evidence of neglect.

The issue of hazards is somewhat more difficult to define because hazards tend to be situational. For example, a very thorny Devil's Walking Stick bordering a public playground might constitute a physical hazard to unwary children, but not elsewhere. Likewise, Poison Ivy or Poison Hemlock and many other plants (including some cultivated plants such as Digitalis, Larkspur and Castor Bean) might be considered hazardous in some locations.

'Management intent' should be considered as the primary factor in determining whether a property is 'intentionally planted' and the provision of necessary maintenance should go a long way to clarify if 'growth is not in a state of neglect, nor presents a hazard to the public health or safety'.

If it is necessary to objectively define what constitutes 'management intent' the recommendations of TLB regarding annual cut down, etc. provide some basis.

As needed, staff would consult with the TLB to help decide when special circumstances create a nuisance, or not. Staff recommends that Council discuss and approve the proposed amendments and direct staff to prepare an ordinance for Council approval.

Fiscal Impact:

Fines collected for violation of an amended City Ordinance may be less than current fine amount for enforcement of tall grass, weeds, brush and tree code requirements.

Council Options:

- #1. Direct staff to prepare a Code amendment ordinance to allow managed natural landscapes on private property.
- #2. Take no action and retain current Code restrictions regarding tall grass, weeds, brush and trees.

§ 125-1 Definitions; word usage.

A. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of this article:

NATURALIZED, NATIVE, OR MANAGED LANDSCAPES - ANY PLANTS OR VEGETATION SUCH AS SHRUBBERY, PERENNIALS, GROUNDCOVER, FLOWERS, ORNAMENTAL GRASSES, ETC., THAT ARE INTENTIONALLY CULTIVATED OR MANAGED IN SUCH A MANNER THAT THE GROWTH IS NOT IN A STATE OF NEGLECT, NOR PRESENTS A HAZARD TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH OR SAFETY. MANAGED LANDSCAPE PLANTINGS SHALL HAVE BEEN INTENTIONALLY PLANTED AND ARE MAINTAINED AS PART OF A GARDEN OR FOR LANDSCAPING PURPOSES AND SHALL NOT ENCROACH, OVERHANG, OR FLOP-OVER ADJACENT PROPERTIES, SIDEWALKS, OR CURBS. THE CITY RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REMOVE ANY AND ALL GROWTH FROM CITY RIGHTS-OF-WAY AT ANY TIME.

§ 125-10 Responsibilities of owners and occupants.

J. It shall be unlawful for any property owner or occupant to allow any weeds, briars, or brush and grass more than one foot in height, EXCEPT FOR NATURALIZED, NATIVE, OR MANAGED LANDSCAPES; as defined; or, any dead or dying trees or tree limbs which constitute a hazard to person or property in the vicinity thereof. The owner or occupant shall keep adjacent City streets, sidewalks and rights-of-way clear of all such obstructions. Any notice of violation issued by a Code Enforcement Officer for a violation of this subsection shall give the property owner, renter, lessee or other occupant 72 hours to correct the violation. Where a municipal infraction citation has been issued for a violation of this subsection, each seventy-two-hour period following the issuance of said citation during which the violation continues shall constitute a separate violation. § 141-1_Nuisances outlined.

Whatever is dangerous to life or health; whatever renders air, food, water or drink unwholesome or unfit for the use of people; whatever odors or exhalations are offensive or dangerous to the public health; and whatever accumulations of animal or vegetable matter, solid or liquid, are dangerous or harmful to the public health or are likely to become so are hereby declared to be nuisances within the scope and meaning of this chapter.

§ 141-8_Maintenance of adjoining rights-of-way.

[Added 3-22-1988 by Ord. No. 87-O-9, Amended 05-xx-2018 by Ord. No. 18-O-xx]

It shall be the duty of the occupant or owner in possession of property adjoining an unimproved public right-of-way adjacent to an improved public right-of-way, i.e., roadway or street, to ensure that grass or weeds, EXCEPT FOR NATURALIZED, NATIVE, OR MANAGED LANDSCAPES, on the unimproved public right-of-way are cut so as to limit their height to 12 inches.

NATURALIZED, NATIVE, OR MANAGED LANDSCAPES ARE ANY PLANTS OR VEGETATION SUCH AS SHRUBBERY, PERENNIALS, GROUNDCOVER, FLOWERS, ORNAMENTAL GRASSES, ETC., THAT ARE INTENTIONALLY CULTIVATED OR MANAGED IN SUCH A MANNER THAT THE GROWTH IS NOT IN A STATE OF NEGLECT, NOR PRESENTS A HAZARD TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH OR SAFETY. MANAGED LANDSCAPE PLANTINGS SHALL HAVE BEEN INTENTIONALLY PLANTED AND ARE MAINTAINED AS PART OF A GARDEN OR FOR LANDSCAPING PURPOSES AND SHALL NOT ENCROACH, OVERHANG, OR FLOP-OVER ADJACENT PROPERTIES, SIDEWALKS, OR CURBS. § 157-2 **Definitions; word usage.**

A. The following terms, wherever used herein or referred to in this chapter, shall have the respective meanings assigned to them unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context:

THE CITY RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REMOVE ANY AND ALL GROWTH FROM CITY RIGHTS-OF-WAY AT ANY TIME.

157-5(B)(1)(a)[11][a]

[11] The exterior of the premises and the condition of accessory structures shall be maintained so that the appearance of the premises and all buildings thereon shall reflect a level of maintenance in keeping with the standards of the neighborhood or such higher standards as may be adopted as part of a plan of urban renewal by the City of College Park and such that the appearance of the premises and structures shall not constitute a blighting factor for adjoining property owners nor an element leading to the progressive deterioration and downgrading of the neighborhood with the accompanying diminution of property values, including the following:

[a] Landscaping. Premises shall be kept landscaped. EXCEPT FOR NATURALIZED, NATIVE, OR MANAGED LANDSCAPES, AS DEFINED, lawns, hedges and bushes shall be kept cut and trimmed. TURF grasses shall not be permitted to grow to a height of more than one foot. Following notification of noncompliance, penalties for violation of this subsection are listed under § **157-4A(2)**.
