

In Memory of Frede Jensen

Frede Jensen, an active SPSer in the late 1950s and early '60s, passed away in Boulder, Colorado on September 13, 2008. Frede was born in Denmark in 1926, earned various degrees at European universities before coming to the U.S. in 1958 and entering the doctorate program in Romance Languages at UCLA. Frede earned his doctorate in 1961 and was a graduate instructor until leaving UCLA in 1964.

Soon after enrolling at UCLA, he joined the Sierra Peaks Section and became an avid mountaineer. On many, many summer weekends between 1958 and 1964, Frede accompanied Andy Smatko, Tom Ross, and this writer on Sierra peak-bagging jaunts. He was a strong, lively companion who thoroughly loved the mountains. Frede earned his SPS emblem in June 1959, having received his DPS emblem the previous January.

Dr. Frede Jensen left UCLA in 1964 and after a short stint as a professor at the University of Calgary, accepted a professorship at the University of Colorado in Boulder. An extraor-



dinary linguist, Frede was fluent in eight languages and had a working knowledge of several others. He authored several books and more than 60 articles on Romance languages philology (the study of language evolution). He became world renowned in this filed before his retirement in 1996.

Aside from intellectual accomplishments, Frede continued to be an avid backpacker and climber. He summitted all 54 of Colorado's 14,000ers in just two summers and continued to hike regularly until shortly before his passing, the result of complications from Parkinson's Disease.

To honor Frede's long devotion to the wilderness, Bob Michael scattered his ashes atop an 11,400 foot Rocky Mountain summit.

OLE, Mark Born New York City, Sept. 18, 1919; died Ventura, CA, April 29, 2009 as the result of a severe stroke. Survived by his wife, Liz; step-daughter, Kristen Gibson; sons, Tony (Diane), Peter, and David;

grandsons, Mark and Blake; sister, Sheila; brother, Les (Esther); and several cousins, nieces and nephews. Major, USAF Res. Ret. Attended USMA Westpoint '44; left at the request of the Academy, which deemed "careless. him reckless. unamenable

discipline." Subsequently, accepted in the US Army Air Corps; following pilot training, he was ordered to Europe and flew P-47s on armed reconnaissance missions (9th Air Force 36th Fighter Group). Like a knight in the Age of Chivalry, his steed an aircraft, along with thousands of others, put their honor and lives on the line to defend Western Civilization against the Nazi onslaught. During R&R in Britain, he met Eve Porter, a Brit who worked with the American Red Cross. He returned to England after the war to marry Eve. They set-

tled in the San Francisco Bay area, while Mark worked and used the GI Bill to complete his undergrad degree, B.S. Mechanical Engineering at U.C. Berkeley, Class of '49. Moving to L. A., he worked as an aerospace engineer at many

defense companies over the course of his career, among them, North American. Hughes, Aerospace. He moved his family to Westchester in 1954. In the 1970's and 80's He was active in the Sierra Club in the Rock Climbing Section, the SPS and DPS. He retired in 1981

47 TOPO MAPS OF SIERRAS AND DESERT DATING TO 1949, \$75. grandbunny@verizon.net

The USGS and the US Forest Service have recently (2008) published an atlas of topo maps covering most of the Sierra. I believe it is selling for \$36 (before tax) and contains around 117 of the 7-1/2' maps, reduced to fit on $8-1/2 \times 11$ paper. The map scale is 1:63,360 (or 1 inch = 1 mile) (which I believe is the same as the Alaska maps). A dozen of the maps have a contour interval of 60'; several dozen have 100'; the rest are 80'.

The result is a series of maps that cover the same land area as the 7-1/2' maps (1/4 of an older 15' maps) but are otherwise similar to the older 15' maps. If you tape four of the new maps together, you end up with something that is comparable to a 15' map.

Similar atlases of the Angeles National Forest and the San Bernardino National Forests were published several years ago.

The USGS has now changed from 30' to 15' to 6' (1:24,000) to 7-1/2' (1:24,000) to 7-1/2 (1:63,350). What next?

Highway consturction continues on U.S. 395

Two major fourlane projects are rolling along in Inyo County

Skanska USA Civil West California District Incv., of Riverside has completed 50 percent ofthe U.S. 395 Blockrock 4-Lane Project.

This highway project upgrades 14 miles of U.S. 395 in Inyo County, between Big Pine and Independence, to a four-lane expressway.

Last week Skanska moved two-way traffic to the new southbound alignment and began improvements and rehabilitation on the northbound alignment of the project. Completion for the project is expected by the spring of 2009.

As work continues between Big Pine and Independence, Granite Construction Company has turned its attention to the south for work on the Manzanar/Independence 4-Lane Project.

This project upgrades 11 miles of U.S. 395 in Inyo County, between Independence and Manzanar.

In addition to the four-lane expressway, this project will and new sidewalks and street lighting, and move overhead utilities underground in the town of Independence.

The completion of this project is scheduled for fall 2010.

"These projects represent part of a commitment that began in 1955 between Caltrans and Inyo, Mono and Kern counties to upgrade the S.R. 14 and U.S. 395 corridor to a four-lane expressway," said District 9 Director Tom Hallenbeck. "Only two secitons of highway remain to complete this goal. They are the Freeman Gulch 4-Lane, sixteen miles on S.R. 14 south of Ridgecrest, and the eleven-mile U.S. 395 Olancha/Cartago 4-Lane near Olancha."

Hallenbeck also said that, when approaching the construction zone, the traveling public is advised to reduce speed, observe the construction signs and watch for construction personnel and equipment.


