



## **Sierra Club - John Muir Chapter's 2007- 08 Legislative Scorecard**

You can't tell the score without a playlist! The Sierra Club - John Muir Chapter's 2007- 08 Legislative Scorecard reflects votes taken by the Wisconsin State Assembly and State Senate on environmental bills. Our scorecard focuses on bills related to the John Muir Chapter's priority issues of reducing global warming and protecting water resources in Wisconsin. Although the session included major environmental victories, such as the historic passage of the Great Lakes Compact, it was frustrating to see that many proposals, including several needed to address our growing energy crisis, fail to receive budget funds or floor votes.

### ***John Muir Chapter Priority: Reducing Global Warming and Promoting Clean, Renewable Energy***

Global warming is the critical conservation challenge of our time that, if unchecked, will result in increased precipitation and temperatures that threaten our plant and animal species, human health, and our economy in Wisconsin. We urgently need to invest in clean, renewable energy, improve energy efficiency, and substantially cut greenhouse gas emissions to reduce the impacts of climate change. Over the past two years, the Sierra Club has invested volunteer and staff resources on lobbying for smart energy solutions to address this far-reaching problem.

Passing the Wisconsin Safe Climate Act, SB 81/ AB 157, was Sierra Club's highest legislative priority during the 2007-08 legislative session. This bill would have required the reduction of carbon dioxide emissions to 1990 levels by the year 2020. In spite of the actions of thousands of Sierra Club members and others who worked to pass this bill through legislative visits, phone calls, signing postcards, and publishing numerous letters-to-the-editor in area newspapers, the Safe Climate Act never got a floor vote during the 2007-08 legislative session. A pull-vote was taken on the Assembly Floor on February 26, 2008 on whether to bring the Safe Climate Act to a floor vote, but this measure failed 51 to 46. In addition, the State Biennial Budget failed to include support for energy efficiency in schools and the Kenosha Racine Milwaukee commuter rail project. In spite of these disappointments, the Budget funded 22 million dollars in grant and loan funds for renewables, and AB 625 was signed into law, which provides support for renewable energy in schools.

Wisconsin currently gets almost 80% of our energy from coal, which contributes to global warming, dirties our air with soot and smog, and contaminates our waters and the fish we consume with mercury, a powerful neurotoxin. The Sierra Club won a groundbreaking lawsuit in November 2007 that requires the University of Wisconsin and the State Department of Administration to bring thirteen state-owned coal plants into compliance with the Clean Air Act. We are currently following up on this key victory.

### ***John Muir Chapter Priority: Protecting the Great Lakes & other Water Resources***

The Great Lakes hold 20% of the earth's fresh water. Therefore, preserving the integrity of this irreplaceable national treasure is one of our chapter's top priorities. To this end, our chapter worked with a coalition of organizations to pass strong Great Lakes Compact implementing legislation during a special session this April. This legislation will prevent the diversion of Lake Michigan and Lake Superior water to other states, countries, or water-bottling corporations. The Strong Compact establishes consistent, ecosystem-based standards for assessing diversion requests, ensuring the fair management of Great Lakes water. Now that all the other Great Lakes states have passed similar legislation, the next step is for Congress to ratify the Compact. Statewide water conservation was not included in the Great Lakes Compact bill that ultimately passed in Wisconsin, leaving that for us to work on during the next legislative session. The John Muir Chapter is also working to protect water quality in our over 10,000 other lakes, streams and rivers through a ban on phosphorus lawn fertilizer, working to prevent polluted runoff from agricultural and industrial sources, and striving to pass a strong rule to reduce mercury emissions from coal-fired power plants that have contaminated fish in every water body in Wisconsin.

### ***Sierra Club Legislative Scorecard 2007-08 Bill Descriptions***

**AB 157 Wisconsin Safe Climate Act** would have required the reduction of carbon dioxide emissions to 1990 levels by the year 2020. Other provisions in the bill included establishing a reporting system, allowing for the use of market mechanisms to achieve emission reductions at least cost, and creating an emergency provision to halt implementation in the case of catastrophic events. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**AB 163 Gut Science-Based Wetland Permitting** would have allowed a road through a wetland by granting an exemption to the requirement for DNR wetlands permits based on scientific analysis for single developments. This compromises the science-based process and degrades Nature's flood mitigation systems. **Environmental Vote = Nay**

**AB 346 Lift Nuclear Moratorium** would have lifted the requirement that the Public Service Commission ensure that secure nuclear waste facilities are identified and all financial costs of life cycle operation are considered against all other alternatives before new nuclear power plants are constructed in Wisconsin. **Environmental Vote = Nay**

**AB 504 / SB 15 Independent DNR Secretary** would have removed politics from the DNR by restoring the authority of the Natural Resources Board, rather than the governor, to select the Secretary of the DNR. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**AB 543: Ordinary High Water Mark** would have given a county the right to overrule the DNR's determination of the ordinary high water mark, or the point on the lakeshore where there is a mark that shows that the presence of surface water ends at that point, where differences exist. This would have allowed for irresponsible, unsafe development in some shoreland areas. **Environmental Vote = Nay**

**AB 718: Delay Smart Growth** would have undermined local comprehensive plans, which reduce sprawl, runoff, and imperil habitat, by unnecessarily delaying the compliance date from Jan 1, 2010 to Jan 1, 2015. **Environmental Vote = Nay**

**AB 805: Gutting Science-Based Land Use Development Guidelines** would have undermined zoning laws and land use regulations that protect public safety and property values by ensuring that science guide local development decisions. **Environmental Vote = Nay**

**SB 523: Great Lakes Compact:** protects our Great Lakes from out of basin diversions, requires water conservation measures within the Great Lakes basin, closes the bottled water loophole, sets permit and monitoring standards, ensures a public process for diversion requests and maintains the integrity of the Great Lakes by establishing fixed community boundaries. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**SB 1: Special Session on Great Lakes Compact:** The compromise legislation that passed the State Senate and Assembly on April 10. Contains all components desired by strong Great Lakes Compact coalition members except statewide water conservation. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**SB 171: Impartial Justice:** would have promoted a more impartial judiciary by allowing candidates for Supreme Court to receive public financing for elections. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**SB 346: Mercury-Containing Products:** would have phased out the use of mercury, a potent neurotoxin, in certain household products. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**SB 397: Electronic Waste** would have required that electronic waste producers collect and properly dispose of video display devices no longer used by consumers to avoid contamination of landfills with toxic substances like mercury, chromium and lead. **Environmental Vote = Aye**

**AB 625: Renewable Energy in Schools** encourages Wisconsin school districts to invest in clean energy by providing them with access to no-interest Clean Renewable Energy Bonds. **Environmental Vote = Aye**
