If you are interested in helping to shut down the DeSantis antihistory/education/people campaign, we need a few people to step up to invest in a small independent film about two Florida school teachers and civil rights trail blazers (acknowledged by Dr. King in his book "Testament of Hope") who were killed by the KKK on their 25th wedding anniversary, December 25, 1951.

My friend, Fort Lauderdale neighbor, and film producer Walter Shaw has produced a book, "The Bomb Heard Around the World," and a school curriculum about Harry and Harriette Moore that was approved and set to go with lesson plans for teachers two years ago until the DeSantis education Commission shut it down. Walter is now working to produce a film that will bypass the DeSantis bans and tell the story about these civil rights heroes who registered over 150,000 African American voters in Florida, initiated over 64 NAACP chapters, and brought their friend Thurgood Marshall (who slept on their couch) to investigate and prosecute Florida lynchings. Walter has an exemption to the Screen Actors Guild strike so that his all-star cast can start filming in September right here in the Ft. Lauderdale area with Jerry Blohm's (Titanic) sets in storage ready to go, with Lionel Ritchie/Merv Warren music for the soundtrack, and a distributor very interested in purchasing the rights.

We just need a few more people to step forward to help/invest with production costs so that the film will be out before the 2024 elections. This is a powerful story that will tell the history our Governor wants to ban, and most importantly, inspire people to register and voters to get out and vote!

Friday December 8th to Sunday 10th 2023 Myakka River State Park

Myakka River State Park near Sarasota is one of the oldest state parks and one of the biggest, and it has the most alligators, and a variety of wildlife which includes deer, a variety of wading birds, wild boar, and lots of owls. Adventurers head for the 39 miles of hiking trails, excellent paved and unpaved biking trails, and the wild and scenic rivers and lakes for kayaking. There is also the canopy walkway and the waterfront café near the lake in the main park. At 37,000 acres, Myakka is one of Florida's most complete outdoor experiences.

We will be camping at Big Flats Campground inside the park. Each campsite has an electrical outlet, and there is a men and women's bathroom with heated showers. There is running water at the campsite.

We will meet at the Big Flat campground on Friday, December 8th at 12 Noon to set up camp. There are only 2 tents allowed per campsite, and we have 3 campsites reserved. We are asking our participants to

only have one tent per family. Each campsite can hold up to 8 people, so space is limited. More information to come. Stay tuned.

She is also interested in the impacts of climate change and sea level rise in Florida. She studied at Purdue University and FAU, is a member of the Florida Invasive Species Council, and is a past president of the FNPS Palm Beach County Chapter. Chris has been a lead instructor for the Florida Master Naturalist Program since 2013.
