

JOHN MORALES is an atmospheric and environmental scientist with a long tenure as a widely respected broadcast meteorologist.

He will discuss public perceptions about climate change in Florida and the U.S., what we know about climate change, impacts in Florida, challenges & opportunity.

Demonstrating eminence both as a scientist and a communicator, Mr. Morales was elected Honorary Member of the American Meteorological Society (AMS)—their highest distinction—and inducted into the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences' Silver Circle for excellence in broadcasting.

He founded and is currently the lead certified consulting meteorologist at ClimaData Corporation, a boutique firm specializing in forensic meteorology and weather consulting.

An update on the Right to Clean Water Campaign

To date, FloridaRightToCleanWater.org has collected 115,000 signed petitions, all due to the amazing efforts of the volunteers that worked on the campaign. Unfortunately, there were not enough petitions to qualify for the 2024 ballot. RTCW needed 900,000!

But there is little disappointment among the RTCW board members and ambassadors. They are quite excited about the prospects for 2026. They've been talking to professionals in the campaign business who think collecting 115,000 petitions through low budget volunteer efforts is extraordinary. This is a testimony to the passion and commitment of our volunteers and to the efforts of supporting organizations and individuals like you.

RTCW feels good about the prospects for 2026 because this time they will be starting with a volunteer infrastructure and level of public awareness that did not exist at the start of this campaign in 2022, and because they will be employing professionals to provide campaign guidance and fundraising. Adventure Out in the Woods at the CREW Bird Rookery Swamp Trail Hosted by Max Goldstein and Adriene Barmann

Broward Sierra Group Is Happy to announce an "Adventurous Day Hike Out in the Swamp" Where: CREW Bird Rookery Swamp (BRS) 1295 Shady Hollow Boulevard, Naples, FL 34120

When: Saturday, December 30th, 2023 at 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM

Details: We will meet at the entrance of the park at the kiosk where our guide will take us out on the hike onto the trail. There is ample parking at the trailhead, picnic tables, and public portable toilet facilities. Be sure to stop by the kiosk for trail maps and additional trail information.

CREW Bird Rookery Swamp is 12 miles of hiking and biking trails, including a 1400-ft. boardwalk with wheelchair accessibility, which will take you along a hiking trail originally constructed in the mid-20th century as a logging railroad tram for the logging of old growth Bald Cypress. Regardless of how much of this trail you explore, you'll discover something new with every visit.

CREW BRS' cypress, maple and pop ash dominated strand swamps are teeming with life, including a large variety of wading birds, Roseate Spoonbills, Great Egrets, and Little Blue herons, and raptors like Barred Owls, Red-shouldered Hawks, Short-tailed Hawks, Sharp-shinned Hawks, and Swallow-tailed

Kites. Undoubtedly, you'll see otters, an abundance of different kinds of turtles, and of course, alligators. Lucky visitors have even been known to spot elusive Florida panthers, Florida black bears, and bobcats.

After the hike we will have lunch at the picnic area. Participants will learn about conservation and efforts to preserve our Green Spaces, and how to take action to preserve these special places.

Broward Sierra Hiking in Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park Hosted by Max Goldstein and Adriene Barmann

Date and Time: Sat, Jan 6, 2024; 9:30 AM - 2:30 PM

Location: 33000 Tamiami Trail E, Ochopee, FL 34141

Details: The Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park is Florida's largest state park. When exploring this 85,000 acre wilderness, you will discover a habitat supporting wildlife that you may have thought vanished. The Fakahatchee Preserve is more than a swamp, it's a mosaic of cypress forest, wet prairies, tropical hardwood hammocks, salt marsh, mangroves, sloughs, and majestic royal palms.

This trail follows an old tram road that was cleared when the cypress in the area was logged in the 1940's-1960's. Lush marsh vegetation featuring giant sword ferns, royal palms, bald cypress, and beautiful wildflowers is one of the main attractions. The park is the only place in the world where the bald cypress trees and towering royal palms share the forest canopy. You may see alligators and possibly deer, bear, and numerous species of birds such as egrets and herons. Maybe even an Everglades Mink and Florida Panther.

We will board the Tram at the visitor's center where the experienced guide will lead the 2

and 1/2 hour tour, pointing out interesting aspects of the preserve. We may stop and take a walk down an old logging trail to see air plants and a variety of ferns and seasonally blooming orchids.

Lunch after the tram ride: We will then drive 10 minutes to Everglades City and meet at **Camelis' Grill on Camelia Street**. They will be busy in January so patience is required! Lunch is a separate cost and will be covered by the participants.

Three-Day Backpacking - Florida Trail, Ocala National Forest

Start: Saturday, February 17, 2024, 8 am End: Monday, February 19, 2024, 4 pm

BACKPACK FLORIDA!!!

Join us for a three-day hike along the southern section of the Ocala National Forest on the Florida National Scenic Trail, one of the most beautiful areas of the Trail, and the site of its earliest section. Our route will begin in classic Florida longleaf pine habitat, with pines that rise like columns to the sky and a slight roll to the landscape.

Our journey will continue past Alexander Springs, a first-magnitude spring. Hiking beyond the Springs, we will be immersed in the unique ecosystem of the Big Scrub encountering sand pine stands of various ages, with an occasional dense understory of Florida rosemary. Beyond the scrub, after passing one of the more beautiful lakes in the Ocala National Forest, we join the edge of the vast Farles Prairie. In wet seasons, the prairie can fill up and simply expand the lake. In drier seasons, prairie grasses rim the edges of lily-dotted ponds in depressions in the vast expanse. After having traversed the Prairie, we will finish our trek at another first-magnitude spring, Juniper Springs.

We will be primitive camping for 2 nights in designated sites in the Forest. Hikers must bring all shelter, food, cooking stove, fuel and water supplies for 3 days. There are natural water sources for water resupply along the route. Water should be filtered or purified, and each hiker will be responsible for bringing their own filter or water purification chemicals. In Ocala National Forest, a bear bag or bear canister is required for all hikers, so each participant will be responsible for bringing a bear bag with rope for hanging, or bear canister. We will hike a total of 30.5 miles over 3 days.
