Clean Energy News



In early September, project bids for offshore wind development in Massachusetts and Rhode Island were selected by the states' two respective energy and environmental agencies, the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER) and the Rhode Island Office of Energy Resources (OER).

✓ In total, 2,878 MW – split across three selected projects – were chosen in the first-of-its-kind joint procurement.

The project selections mark a significant milestone in New England's regional efforts to decarbonize the grid, build clean power, and lower energy costs.

These bids represent enough renewable energy to power 1.5 million homes!

Climate Bill Update

Despite the legislative session ending on July 31st, advocates have continued to put pressure the legislature to pass a strong bill by convening for a formal fall session. Unfortunately, last week, the Governor signaled that she's willing to pass a bill that doesn't scale back the expansion of our methane gas system, which is critical to stopping climate change and lowering ratepayer bills.



This is unacceptable. We need a serious bill that protects environmental justice communities, workers, and all our communities from the ballooning costs of pollution from the expanding gas system here in MA. So let's demand that our for-profit utility companies take climate change seriously and pass a bill that moves us beyond gas and into our clean energy future.

National Action Spotlight: Forests
