
### **Plant-based Cooking Demonstration**

# Where does the climate bill stand?

After a few rough weeks, legislators report <u>they are negotiating again</u>. It's clear that our advocacy is working. As a reminder, if you haven't already, <u>send your representatives a message</u>, to let them know you are watching and you care! In an effort to send a clear message, most of the Massachusetts environmental movement has coalesced around two main things that absolutely MUST be in the bill. Here's what they are:

- 1. The legislature must pass something that stops expanding the methane gas system! Some want to exclude this from the bill and only reform how we site energy infrastructure, but that is not enough.
- 2. Include measures to prevent building new infrastructure in already overburdened communities. As we decide where to put new electric

infrastructure, we can't follow the historic pattern of placing it in communities that are already heavily polluted due to racial and economic injustice.

Our final ask is that the legislature reconvene for a special formal session and pass a comprehensive CLIMATE bill, not a flimsy piece of siting reform tucked into an economic development bond bill or a supplemental budget. To pass a climate bill, they would likely need to call a special session.

#### Harvest Your Energy Festival


- Saturday, October 19th from 12-3pm
