

# SC Honey Island Group and St Tammany Master Gardeners Host Kick-Off Zoom for Fontainebleau Gardens Project

Sierra Club Honey Island Group and St. Tammany Master Gardeners invite you to join us as we kickoff our project to develop and maintain the gardens and trail areas of Fontainebleau State Park in Mandeville, LA.

Because of state cutbacks maintenance staff have been cut dramatically and our planning and planting will help keep this "Queen of Parks" in the dignified state she deserves. We will introduce the basic concepts that we hope to develop in the gardens, such as native plantings and educational tagging of plants whenever possible.

#### WATER SENTINELS GROUPS FORM AROUND STATE

Louisiana's first Water Sentinels groups formed in Lafayette back in 2010 to monitor the waters of Bayou Teche. They continued monitoring for over six years.

Recently the Delta Chapter formed a new Water Sentinels group to assist in the care of the Atchafalaya Basin. They will work with biologists to monitor the streams in the Basin.

Last month, four members of the New Orleans and Honey Island Groups went through training with the Pearl Riverkeeper program to become monitors. Besides assisting with testing on the lower Pearl, both East and West streams, the new Sentinels will also be testing for bacterial content and other impurities in the Tchefuncte River in St. Tammany Parish.

Inspired by the enthusiasm, Baton Rouge is now working to develop a Water Sentinels group to monitor Bayou Manchae!



# Skinks and Lizards may be protecting people from Lyme disease in the southeastern United States

...in the south, the ticks prefer to feed on lizards, particularly skinks. These sleek, smooth-scaled reptiles often live in leaves and twigs that have fallen on the ground—so-called leaf litter—and are particularly poor transmitters of the Lyme pathogens. So fewer southern ticks are infected and fewer people get sick—the team reported last week in PLOS Biology.
