The Ecology Center is a 28-acre Regenerative Organic Certified™ farm and education center that serves as a hub for southern California's ecological movement. The agricultural and business practices followed are based on traditional principles of collective land stewardship, using the mutually supportive relationships found in nature to nourish humans, plants, and soil. This rigorous model focuses on the long-term health of the land. The Center's onsite and outreach programs create an ecosystem to gather and build a community of creatives, self-starters, architects, makers, farmers, culinary leaders, visionaries, educators, and organizers. The Ecology Center acknowledges that this 28-acre Regenerative Organic Certified™ farm rests on the traditional and unceded sacred lands of the Juaneño Band of Mission Indians known as the Acjachemen Nation.

## **Santiago Creek Update**



Three small but significant steps toward rehabilitating Santiago Creek were taken concerning the creek's section in Orange and farther downstream in Santa Ana:

- 1. OC Reclamations, a subsidiary of Chandler's Sand & Gravel, has agreed to donate their gravel pit at the corner of North Cannon Street and Santiago Canyon Road to the city of Orange. Our Conservation Committee is sending a letter to the City of Orange suggesting that management of this newly public area be assigned to Orange County Parks.
- Several priorities were addressed in the Water Resources Development Act of 2024 that affect Santiago Creek. Representative Lou Correa's (CA-46) office issued a <u>press release on July 23, 2024</u>, that addresses, among other items, green space along Santiago Creek.
- 3. The US Army Corps of Engineers' project to "improve" Santiago Creek in Santa Ana appears to be on hold. Les Hall has published an extensive article about this issue in the Spring 2024 edition of the *Neighborhood News* of the Fisher Park Neighborhood Association. We thank him for allowing us to republish it <a href="here">here</a>.

These actions came about only because of the tremendous grassroots involvement of community activists in central Orange County!



A major battle is brewing in San Juan Capistrano over an electric battery facility. This is an important environmental issue pitting local public safety concerns against dire global needs.





Some things to know:


Terms are for two years and begin in January 2025.
