
Welcoming a new executive director

WATER

The Angeles Chapter Water Committee had a very fruitful 2022. We were able to put an end to 2 disastrous ocean desalination projects, one in Huntington Beach - The Brookfield Poseidon Ocean Desalination Project, and the other in El Segundo - the West Basin Ocean Desalination Project, thus ending an almost 2-decade fight. We were kept busy for the 2022 election season as we participated in the vetting of water board candidates across LA and Orange Counties to ensure we elected the best progressive candidates for our water future. FIGHTING OIL & GAS

We say "NO!" to the oil industry profiting by polluting our air, our water, our land, our bodies, and our planet.

TRANSFORM OUR ENERGY SYSTEM

We made huge strides in the California Air Resources Board's (CARB) Scoping Plan, the state's climate blueprint. Sierra Club volunteers, alongside members from the California Environmental Justice Alliance, rallied to demand that CARB exclude their proposed 10 new gigawatts of gas capacity - the equivalent to 100 new peaker plants in the plan. As a result, in an unprecedented move, CARB reversed their decision and excluded all new gas plants from their state-wide plan. However, locally, the City of Glendale voted to build out California's last new gas plant, although at a much smaller scale than originally planned. LADWP also made moves to retrofit their Scattergood gas plant to burn a blend of methane and hydrogen gas. We raised concerns about harmful pollutants that are emitted when burning hydrogen and the associated climate, safety and financial risks of locking our region into a hydrogen combustion future.

Building Electrification

VICTORY: THIS YEAR WE SAW SEVERAL CITIES IN OUR REGION PRIORITIZE PUBLIC HEALTH, CLEAN AIR AND CLIMATE BY PASSING MUCH NEEDED BUILDING ELECTRIFICATION REACH CODES AND ORDINANCES. OUR WINS INCLUDE PASADENA, GLENDALE, LOS ANGELES CITY, LOS ANGELES COUNTY [INTRODUCED MOTION], AGOURA HILLS AND AT THE SQAQMD AND CARB SCOPING PLANS.

Conservation Program Manager Angeles Chapter In 2022 we were able to see the synergy between all our climate and energy campaigns especially to see a focus and ESJ-centered approach in our Building Electrification Campaign. It is really exciting to work on a campaign that is intentional about the Just Transition so our most impacted communities are prioritized in the movement to Electrify Everything. It is also very exciting to work with other EJ groups and coalitions as we seek to advocate for the most health, jobs, air, and climate benefits for the most impacted and historically disinvested communities which are often the ones burdened by environmental racism.

In addition to campaign victories, we actively monitored many more environmental issues.

A small selection of these:

- Port of LA the Air Quality Management District begins an indirect source rule for diesel emissions
- Newport Bay Ecological Reserve Fence Advocacy, OC Safe Trails Coalition Advocacy
- Sepulveda/405 Transit Tunnel
- LA Gondola/Aerial Rapid Transit
- Canyon Loop Trail improvement project
- Several development projects in Santa Clarita
- Montebello Hills development and California Gnatcatcher Reserve
- San Gabriel Valley oppose the expansion of the Quemetco battery plant, fight the growth of Hsi Lai Temple development into the open space area of Puente Chino Hills wildlife corridor, and protect 13,000-year-old Jurupa Oak from nearby housing/commercial development.
- Transit to trails program development in the San Gabriel Mountains



The Los Angeles Inspiring Connections Outdoors (Angeles Chapter) serves as a bridge that enables underserved youth, persons with disabilities, and others to visit and develop an appreciation for our natural environment. We work with schools, community groups, and other agencies to create safe and enjoyable outdoor experiences for persons who might not otherwise have them. This year we led 93 successful outings for 3,014 participants. In addition to our core program of day hikes, we also completed service-oriented camping trips in Yosemite and the San Gabriel Mountains. Two other highlights were our first annual Earth Day Celebration and a new partnership with the Los Angeles Maritime Institute to provide sailing adventures.
