

BIODIESEL TO BE OFFERED AT PORT EVERGLADES

Port Everglades stores and supplies most of the fuel in South Florida, and distributes it with over 1,000 petroleum tanker truck shipments per day. In April, some of these tankers will be delivering biodiesel, a cleaner burning alternative to petroleumbased diesel. The National Biodiesel Board (NBB) states that "biodiesel is made from renewable resources like soybeans and other natural fats and oils, grown in the United States."

The most obvious advantage of biodiesel is that the carbon dioxide



(CO2) that is released into the atmosphere during diesel combustion is offset by the CO2 that is absorbed from the atmosphere by the agricultural crops during production. In this aspect, biodiesel is renewable, and reduces greenhouse gas emissions if used instead of petro-diesel. However, since fossil fuels are used during its production

and distribution, using biodiesel is no substitute for conserving



energy by driving less and using more efficient products.

Current users of biodiesel include the Florida government; Florida Power and Light; Everglades National Park; Miami and Ft. Lauderdale Airports; the City of Coconut Creek; and the Ft. Lauderdale water taxis.* The improved availability of biodiesel should help drive costs down, as even with the tax incentives, biodiesel is still more expensive than the heavily subsidized fossil fuel diesel. Biodiesel can be consumed straight (B100) or in a blend such as 20% biodiesel and 80% petroleum-based diesel (B20). It can run in modern diesel engines with no modifications, but older diesel engines must have their hoses replaced with modern hoses that are compatible with biodiesel. NBB states that "use of biodiesel in existing diesel engines does not void parts and materials workmanship warranties of any major US engine manufacturer."

The US Department of Energy (DOE) and US Department of Agriculture (USDA) Biodiesel Lifecycle Inventory Study compared findings for a comprehensive "cradle to grave" inventory of materials used; energy resources consumed; and air, water and solid waste emissions generated by petroleum diesel fuels and biodiesel. Their comparison of the total "lifecycle" costs and benefits of each of the fuels concluded that compared to petroleum diesel, biodiesel is four times as efficient in utilizing fossil energy, and Biodiesel and B20 exhibit similar fuel economy to diesel fuel. continued on page 2

Biodiesel has superior lubricity (which reduces engine wear), and similar BTU content/ performance ratings compared with petrodiesel. As the table indicates, biodiesel is also less dirty than petro-diesel. Moreover, biodiesel is essentially free of harmful aromatics such as benzene, toluene, and xylene.

One must wonder what impact growing biodiesel crops has on land use. Most biodiesel comes from soy, which yields on average about sixty gallons of biodiesel per acre each year. However, the NBB states that there is an annual surplus of one billion pounds of soy oil produced as a byproduct of protein feed for livestock. That much oil could yield 130 million gallons of biodiesel, with 100 million pounds of glycerin left as a by-product. Perhaps we can use the glycerin to offset the grease used in soap, which is currently derived from waste livestock, cats, dogs, and other "unwanted" animals..

As biodiesel consumption increases, we should ensure that new sources of biodiesel are not increasing demand for land. New research by the University of New Hampshire claims that algae ponds at wastewater treatment plants can yield thousands of gallons of biodiesel per acre each year. Perhaps that would offer our sewage plants an economic incentive to clean up their waste and produce biodiesel, rather than injecting our sewage under our aquifer or pumping it onto our reefs. This should reduce the algal blooms that are killing so much of our sea life.

What you can do:

Ask your local municipality to convert its diesel fleets to biodiesel, to save on main-tenance costs and significantly lower their harmful emissions of carcinogens.

Ask local marinas to provide biodiesel, then buy it for your boat, or ask the diving and fishing boats to use it. Tell them they'll have fewer seasick people and less soot to clean up.

Ask your local fuel station to provide biodiesel, then buy it instead of petro-diesel.
