GREENING YOUR WORKPLACE

As Sierrans, we do our part to follow "green" practices in our homes, and to lobby administrative agencies and elected officials to establish



environmentally sound public policy. No doubt many of us have also considered how we can take steps in our workplaces to minimize our ecological footprint. We can only implement these steps company-wide if we are business owners or are in supervisory positions. However, as employees we can suggest these practices to our bosses, and many of the recommendations we can implement individually regardless of company practices (for example, bringing your own mug to work, rather than using disposable cups supplied by your employer). Below are some suggested steps we can take:

- 1. Reduce paper usage. One way to cut paper usage is to use "print preview" before printing. If the document is one you created, you can catch mistakes and correct them before you print. If the item to be printed is not a document you created, you can see how many pages there are, and if you really need to print every page (particularly useful when printing from websites). If you print a page that cannot be used, keep it and use the back for scrap paper, or even reuse the page in the printer, when printing something that will not have to be provided to others outside of your company. Always remember that as important as recycling is, it still requires more energy consumption to recycle an item into something else than to reuse the item, as is. You can use E-Fax or similar services to receive faxes, which arrive as attachments to e-mails, which can then be downloaded and saved to the applicable computer directory. Most of the time it is not necessary to print them.
- 2. Reduce electricity consumption. Turn off electronic equipment when not in use, including computers, monitors, and printers. That may seem obvious, but in some offices the standard practice is to log out at the end of the day, but leave the computers turned on continuously. Make sure that the monitor is turned off along with the computer. You can achieve even higher energy savings by unplugging overnight the power strip into which your computer, monitor, and other office equipment are plugged. If your office has sizeable windows that allow in ample natural light, consider turning the lights off. Purchase energyefficient office equipment, by looking for Energy Star rated products (see www.energystar.gov for more information).
- 3. Use recycled office supplies. Seek out office supplies with the highest recycled content you can find, including legal pads, copy paper, Post-It notes, file folders, etc. While Office Depot and other major office supply companies increasingly offer such supplies, additional eco-friendly office products are available through companies specializing in such office supplies. A listing of such companies can be found at www.greenpages.org. Also, there are local companies offering business cards printed on recycled card stock. Don't forget about other types of paper products you may use in your workplace: buy recycled toilet paper, recycled napkins, etc.
- 4. Reduce gasoline consumption. In scheduling appointments outside the office, where possible, try to cluster multiple appointments into a single trip, rather than having to repeatedly return to the office and leave again, thereby reducing mileage as well as using your time more efficiently. Consider whether a telephone conference can be substituted for a face-to-face meeting. If feasible for the size of your company, create incentives for employees to carpool, drive more fuelefficient cars, and/or use public transportation.

- 5. Choose reusable over disposable products. Supply mugs so employees can use them instead of disposable cups. Consider supplying dishes, silverware, etc. rather than paper plates and disposable utensils. This will likely save the office money in the long run.
- 6. Provide a non-toxic work environment for yourself and your employees. Purchase non-toxic eco-friendly cleaning supplies. If you redecorate the office, look for low or no-VOC paints. VOC stands for volatile organic compounds, many of which are suspected carcinogens, and can also cause eye, nose, and throat irritation; headaches, loss of coordination, nausea; and damage to liver, kidney, and central nervous system (see www.epa.gov/iag/voc.html). This change in your office practices may actually increase productivity, by leading to less illness and absenteeism among employees, some of whom may be chemically sensitive or have allergies.

But enough said. We all get the point of recycling to benefit the environment, but an extra bonus appeared in the dollar aspect of my creative reuse when my husband (an avid Sierra member and environmentalist) showed me on a piece of (recycled) paper, over \$20 per month calculated savings, which amounted to more than \$240 a year... which I used to buy a roundtrip airplane ticket to visit a longtime friend in California.

The seven steps outlined above are a good start, but there is much more you can do. For more information on steps you can take to "green" your workplace, check out these websites:


