BROWARD SIERRA CLUB ELECTIONS - By Mara Shlackman, Broward Sierra Group Chair

It's election season not just for our nation but for the Broward Group. Our Group bylaws require that an election for membership on the Broward Group Executive Committee (EXCOM) take place in the fourth quarter of each year. EXCOM has seven members, who serve staggered two-year terms. This year, three EXCOM members' terms expire.

On August 7, 2012, pursuant to the bylaws, EXCOM appointed a **Nominating Committee**, consisting of Phil

Busey (philip@busey.org), Art Joseph (rogerwilcotj@bellsouth.net), and Ina Topper (irtopper2000@cs.com). Their task is to identify and evaluate candidates to run for the vacancies on EXCOM.

In the same manner as last year, the election ballots, accompanied by profiles of the candidates, will go out to all members through the mail (snail mail, not e-mail). Members will have four weeks to consider and submit their ballots. An Election Committee appointed by EXCOM, consisting of three Group members, none of whom are candidates for EXCOM, will count the ballots after the deadline for return of the ballots, and will report the results.

The following is the calendar for the election process:

Sept. 30, 2012 Deadline for submission of candidate names to Nominating Committee

Deadline for report by Nominating Committee to EXCOM Oct. 8, 2012 on candidates for ballot

Oct. 25, 2012 Deadline for submission of petitions by petition candidates. (As an alternative to being placed on the ballot by approval of the Nominating Committee, a candidate can obtain the signatures of 20 members of the Broward Group prior to this deadline and be placed on the ballot as a petition candidate.)

Nov. 12, 2012 Deadline for appointing Election Committee (members must be appointed before ballots are mailed)

Nov. 13, 2012 Deadline for mailing ballots to members

Dec. 17, 2012 Deadline for arrival of completed ballots in Broward Group P.O. Box

If you would like to become more involved in Broward Sierra Group and its decision-making, please contact a member of the Nominating Committee (listed on the left) by the end of September to express your interest. Developing new leaders over time contributes to the well-being of the Club and our ability to educate the public and advocate for preservation of our environment.

MUSEUM OF DISCOVERY AND SCIENCE ANIMAL DAY

The Broward Group of the Sierra Club was pleased to be invited by the Museum to participate in its Animal Day event on August 18th and 19th. A real team effort with our Excom members and volunteers went into the planning of our presence at this event to be able to inform the public about the sad plight of our Florida Panther.

The Museum staff was so helpful with everything, which made the organizing so much easier. They set up tables, and we set up signs, posters and pictures, and also prepared and presented a delightful Powerpoint slide show, of pictures of Florida Panthers and their kittens. The Museum gave us permission to circulate a petition to the public, to be signed and sent to Dan Ashe, Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) in Washington D.C. The Fish and Wildlife Service states that it is dedicated to the conservation of fish and wildlife and their habitats. However, when five organizations, including the Sierra Club, petitioned USFWS to designate critical habitat for the Florida Panther, USFWS denied the petition, a big disappointment to a great many people working very hard to save the panther. USFWS has granted over 140 permits to build projects right in and around Florida Panther territory over the last 12 to 14 years, but they have never granted critical habitat protection to the area to protect the extinction of the panther.

So we Sierrans set about asking the public for help, to put pressure on this agency, with public signatures. With really tremendous efforts, walking the floors for hours, and talking to people, we collected over 300 signatures to send to Washington D.C., in hopes of changing their officials' minds.

At the museum, a separate table was set up for the children to sit down and color pictures of panthers, sign their names and write a sentence about saving the Panther if they could. After all, it was the school children that first selected the Panther as our state animal! So it was quite fitting that they be included in our efforts to save this animal. We then added the colored pictures to the signed petitions and sent them on to the Sierra Club office in St. Petersburg for review before being sent off to Washington D.C.

On Saturday, Stanley, the Florida Panther Hockey Team Mascot, was generously loaned to us by the Florida Panther Hockey Team Association for the



occasion. Stanley was a terrific hit, a real draw to our tables! The children were at once terrified, then thrilled, to see tall Stanley loping up to them, grabbing their hands, hugging them, making them laugh and jump up and down in total excitement! Of course this added to the attracting of an audience and more people came over to see what was happening. In that way, we were able to ask more people to sign our petitions.

I personally want you to know how your Excom team and great volunteers were so helpful in getting this event together. The results were so positive! The public was informed about the Panther's situation and about our Sierra Club organization. We collected signatures for the petition. The children were made aware of the Panther situation, and the Museum loved our exhibit, and asked us to come back for more events this year! This tabling event was a real success thanks to all our members' great team work!



The annual picnic was as much fun as ever. There was a good turnout and a clear day despite the forecast for bad weather. Matt Schwartz, Barbara Ruge, and Max Goldstein gave us updates on some of our current environmental issues. And a special thanks to Richard Chesen for letting everyone try out paddle boarding on his board.

PROTECT FLORIDA'S LANDS BY CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENT** – By Mara Shlackman, Broward Sierra Group Chair

The Florida Legislature's funding for acquisition of conservation lands through the Florida Forever program has declined precipitously in the last few years. To ensure that the Legislature allocates a fixed portion of an existing revenue source for acquisition and restoration of conservation lands, the Sierra Club has joined several other major environmental organizations in backing a proposed constitutional amendment to dedicate 33 percent of net revenues from the existing excise tax on documents (documents related to the sale of property) for 20 years, in order to fund acquisition and restoration of conservation lands. The coalition, called Florida's Water and Land Legacy. is seeking one million signatures in order to place the amendment on the November 2014 ballot. WILL THE WHOLE WORLD BAN PLASTIC BAGS BEFORE WE DO?

This question was posed just last week at an environmental event in Miramar, attended by Sierra ExCom members, where the movie "Bag It" was shown (see bagitmovie.com). Recently, the topic became even more acute when some of our ExCommers took up Waste Management on an invitation to tour their plant here in Broward County. As it turns out, unbeknownst to us all, Waste management has to stop its plant several times a day, just to remove plastic bags hampering all functioning of its equipment. We Sierrans, having been familiar now for some time with the all out war on the plastic bag problem in many of the Third World countries, are also wondering, WHEN will we be able to convince the general public here at home that it's time to face this environmental monster?

Returning from several trips abroad this summer, once again, it's obvious that many communities elsewhere are way ahead of us. The general public in all of Western Europe daily goes out the door with at least one or two recyclable shopping bags on their persons, whereas here we are still accustomed to "loading up the bags" at checkout counters. Yes, we DO, on occasion, forget about the permanent bag, and I'll plead guilty to that one as well. But it would behoove us to still (re-)educate to cashiers NOT to use one single bag for every item purchased! It's astounding how many customers can be seen going out the door at supermarkets pushing a shopping cart loaded up with some 20 bags or more, each bag often containing ONE item, for a week's worth of groceries.

In an interview with Capt. Charles Moore, founder of the Algalite Research Foundation, Moore stated that the ocean's "plastic cesspool (was) repeatedly snagging their boat's propellers" while they conducted their plastic/marine research.

In fact, I heard recently from some people in the know in Canada, that more and more fine, gritty plastic substances are found in fish intestines everywhere. This troubling statement was followed by

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a matter of fact comment that our global fish consumption, in all probability, would be endangered in the now very near future.

While it is known that ALL types of plastics are currently affecting global fish populations, the issue of daily plastic bag waste should be

the easiest to combat. And yes, again according to Moore, some 100,000 albatross chicks are known to choke to death on assorted plastic items like bottle caps, etc. each year. But it is simply the ingesting of plastic bag material which leads to the demise of even the biggest marine animals, due to malnourishment. A fish stomach filled with such (plastic) remnants simply signals a fish that there's no need for further nourishment.

In Los Angeles there is currently a fight regarding banning of singleuse plastic bags in all supermarkets and convenience stores. While we Sierrans were at first delighted last month at reading about the city's ban in the daily press, not surprisingly, the plastic bag industry is going all-out to prevent this ban. (Just a thought, could it be that Florida's peculiar statute prohibiting cities from enacting local plastic bag bans, hails from the same industrial source?) Another fact to think about, in view of our nation's oil dilemma, is that 11 barrels of oil are needed to produce 1 ton of plastic bags, according to the EPA. Surprisingly, or perhaps not surprisingly, developing countries are far ahead of us in banning the bag. For example, Bangladesh, which has a rather primitive open sewage system, discovered big bundles of discarded bags clogging the (open sewage) outlets, resulting in very unsanitary backups throughout many residential areas. Also, a total lack of garbage pickup in several Central African nations, led to the so-called "permanently flowering plastic bag trees," creating enough consternation to promote an all out ban.

At present, once again our Sierra Club objective is refocusing on local, even statewide, encouragement of drastic reduction, even hopefully, almost eliminating daily plastic bag usage. Could we all do our part? Right now, (1) just put a small foldable bag in your purse/attache case - Target has some good ones for just a dollar, and (2) put some larger bags in the car trunk(s) (surely you have some floating around the house.) Don't forget: several stores, including Target and Ikea, deduct some money for every reusable bag you hand them.

In the end, gently remind the cashier that plastic bags need some 1000 years to disintegrate (many don't know it!) and, therefore, NOT to "Bag It."
