BAN ON PLASTIC BAGS IN CALIFORNIA - By Ina Oost Topper, Broward Sierra Chair



Ah! Those plastic bags – again..... (an update)

California: the state often being the first to 'go green' in many ways, once more leads the way. Recently the state's legislature enacted a statewide ban on the use of plastic bags. Bravo!

Governor Jerry Brown, stating that over 50 different cities and towns in the state had started creating a confusing array of local ordinances, proposed that the time was right for an all encompassing statewide ban on those pesky bags.

Apparently, according to some local spokesperson and quoted by NBC, far too many plastic bags were "floating in green slime in the Compton Creek" (a tributary to the Los Angeles river) and thereby

spreading the misery throughout the state.

Subsequently the state is the nation's first, as it has been for a long time in so many ways. Not only for banning smoking on the state's highways, even in one's own car, but also the drastic limitations on water usage for lawns, car washing, etc.

Many of the rules address practical goals. For instance, there's the well known danger of California's wildfires, often the result of a cigarette carelessly discarded out a car window. And California also imposes the nation's highest fines for throwing trash in the streets or alongside the roads! Many states have a maximum fine of perhaps \$500 for illegal dumping. In California a \$1,000 fine is common, for anything tossed out, especially on a stretch of highway. After all, being the second largest state, cleaning up all this trash from the highways was costing California an astronomical amount. And the watering issue with most of the state in a severe drought for many years, it makes perfect sense to levy fines for unnecessary water usage.

So now the plastic bag problem is being tackled, at least in California.

I want to remind everyone here in South Florida, that not only do the bags create a

This is a good time to start talking to our local representatives to finally do away with the preposterous Florida law stating that ANY LOCAL ORDINANCE BANNING PLASTIC BAGS IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED! 
