Surely, some real expert would find fault with the word 'pristine' but yet....

Here and there, in between the extensive dense mangrove

tunnels, blissfully shielded from the hot Florida sun, we would suddenly find ourselves on a wide open lake. There we were surprised by flocks of birds suddenly flying out of (nesting) trees, possibly surprised by our approach, providing the photographers among us some excellent shots.

I want to remind all our Broward Sierrans that we have a wonderful outings program in place, which perhaps some people are not even aware of. We go into many infrequently visited areas of our beautiful and very unique South Florida, and there's definitely an option for any and all of us. One can join the hikes, most of which are not too strenuous for young or old to take part in. And after many years of being too busy, having joined a great daylong canoe trip, I urge all of you to make a point of going on one of our outings.
