One of the most interesting nature hikes here in South Florida inevitably takes us into the Big Cypress Preserve. In early December, under the capable leadership of Jackie Fisher, and accompanied by outings leader Judy Kuchta, we were fortunate to have one of those most glorious dry-season days one could only wish for.

Besides seeing quite a few alligators, some of them biiiiiig gators (rest assured, if you leave them alone, they will leave you alone...), we were also fortunate to see woodstorks, blue herons, and owls unique to our local area. Yes, besides the Burrowing Owl, which is, thanks to our joint efforts, now being added to the endangered list, there are also owls that live in trees. Amazingly we spotted one in bright sunshine, sitting high up in a tree - contrary to expecting these interesting birds to be nocturnal.

There were also the unusual plants: bushes with snow berries, and dense sections of Saw Palmetto. Little did we know that this type of palm-like underbrush is one of the slowest growing plants known to mankind. A short, barely 2 feet high brush can take years to grow to that height! A very rare sight were some of the most unusual orchid-like miniflowers; it brought back memories of Carl Hiaasen's Orchid Thief, the book as well as the movie.



Look for other great Sierra outings! This is the best time of the year to go into the great outdoors with relative ease, as the Everglades' water level is now at its lowest, and daytime temperature is within an easy comfort zone. See you on our next hike!


Broward Sierra Club's General Meetings - The first Thursday of each month we have committee reports and an educational program on conservation or environmental issues.

One of our long time Broward Sierra members, Tanya Tweeton, passed away this year. Tanya was also an active member of the Audubon Society, where I first met her. Her heart was into preserving nature, speaking up whenever and wherever protecting our environment was a focal point.

Besides both these environmental groups, Tanya was also keenly interested in off the beaten track indie and foreign movies. As a member of the Cinema Paradiso film society, she often encouraged me to join her to attend one of the many fascinating movies there, especially when it pertained to environmentally related subjects.

On a personal level, Tanya took a keen interest in her parents' Czech background. Not only did she visit the Czech Republic in order to track down all her cousins (whom she had never previously met), she even dove head-on into studying the Czech language before taking off for Europe.

Tanya's grandchildren were her greatest love, and she took special pride in her granddaughter Charlotte, who lived with her daughter and family in Italy, and who was becoming a very accomplished swimmer at every competitive swimming event, even at a young age. The times the



family visited Tanya here in Florida were often centered around Tanya taking the 2 granddaughters to all major swimming pools and aquatic training facilities in South Florida, where it was soon determined that Charlotte (Carlotta, as she's called in Italian) showed great promise for almost certainly being part of a future Olympic swimming team. This, Tanya often said, would be her greatest accomplishment. May this now be her legacy, besides the many countless hours spent on preserving our environment.
