A synopsis of the specific issues that were highlighted by all the experts who had graciously agreed to come join us this day we had:

Scott Sheckman and Michelle Graulty, from Friends of our Florida Reefs, talked to us about the increasingly precarious situation of our coral reefs. There are still some in our community who do not even KNOW we have reefs right off the Fort Lauderdale beaches!

Also, as part of ocean awareness, Catherine "Cat" Uden of Oceana informed the audience about the ever-increasing urgency to keep our oceans debris-free. While one would think it should need extra emphasis, the horrendous amounts, tons of it, really, of a multitude of plastics presently floating throughout our oceans is one issue that can keep someone up at night. Not only are these plastics turning into the minutest mini-pellets, ingested by every marine animal, the multitude of plastic bags is, to our great dismay, being confused as food by those magnificent sea turtles we're so proud to have along our coasts.

When it comes to water, the Miami Water Keepers' speaker Colli Schladweiler informed us at length how our waters need to be kept clean - not just for us to swim in but alas, the seagrass especially in the Biscayne Bay area is dying....What will happen to future shoals of fish that use these grasses as their 'home' is all but anyone's guess.

Coming back to our beloved sea turtles, Richard Whitecloud, who we've had the pleasure of inviting many times for his unique and very entertaining turtle presentations, spoke in more detail about what's so precarious for the turtles' food situation. Some species live almost exclusively on jellyfish! Needless to say, a shiny, floating plastic bag will look identical in this regard and easily mistaken for a daily meal by these unique marine creatures. One thing more when it comes to the sea turtle: with the increase of our planet's warming, the turtle eggs are just not staying at a healthy temperature, so to say, and due to the beach sand temperature deciding on the offspring's sex, way TOO many females are nowadays seeing the light. Oh, and talking about light: of course a lot has been done about shading the street lights on Fort Lauderdale's ocean front. But the higher apartment buildings and hotels being constructed in recent years at a phenomenal pace are not helping the baby turtles finding their way into the ocean, instead of heading in the wrong direction - for the boulevard.

Dr. Harold Wanless, of the University of Miami's Geology Department, gave us a very scientific account of how the sea level especially here in So. Florida is rising much faster than was ever predicted. One shudders to think how the NEXT predictions might even be more worrisome than at the present time.

I'll end this article by mentioning TED talk speaker Aryan Ranjan, who was truly inspiring, strongly encouraging us all to not just 'listen' but start getting involved in preserving our environment for future generations. And, we mention here the 'bird lady' as she may be called, Paddy Cunningham, also known from the Audubon Society here in South Florida, who can just about identify any bird that's calling South Florida home.... Maybe some of you may want to join her some day on a so-called "bird-hike", which also makes for a wonderful walk in mother nature.

We're pleased to add some pictures in this newsletter - and maybe see you next time!






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
