# Earth Day 2022

The Broward Sierra Club will be having an Earth Day event on Saturday, March 12, 2022 to celebrate 120 Years of the Sierra Club (founded 1892). It will be at the Anne Kolb Nature Center in Hollywood and we're planning on a lot of speakers and tabling. We'll have more information as we get closer, but put it on your calendar!

#### NO private condo tower on Hollywood Public Beach

Our battle continues against a 30-story condo on our public oceanfront land, spearheaded by Cat Uden (who has apparently been running into some <u>free speech issues</u>).

The proposed redevelopment project is located at 1301 S. Ocean Drive on the barrier island in Hollywood. It is public land. This approximately 4-acre site is located south of Hollywood Boulevard on A1A, at Azalea Terrace/Bougainvillea Terrace. The property currently houses the Hollywood Beach Culture and Community Center, Harry Berry Park, an outdoor stage with a shade covering, mature dunes, public restrooms, and public parking. The property is a Certified Wildlife Habitat. This ocean front property was deeded to the City of Hollywood for "open space, park, recreational, and other public and municipal purposes in 1974. The Broward Sierra Club has been upfront and outspoken against the development of this open space since March of 2021 when a local Hollywood resident reached out to us to try and stop this project from moving forward.

The Related Group developers have been relentless in trying to earn support from local residents by making promises of decreased taxes and other amenities. But with the Broward Sierra Club's support under the leadership of Conservation Chair Sue Caruso and Vice Chair Adriene Barmann, along with Cat Uden, a local activist, Loxahatchee's Sierra Club Drew Martin, and Attorney's Richard Grosso and Stuart Reed, this dream team has gained momentum and support by multiple Hollywood organizations to try and stop this awful project. Our presence at multiple commission meetings, and the Sun-Sentinel articles that have educated the public about the proposed development have created a strong opposition against the proposal.

The final Commissioners meeting that was intended to answer questions from the public about the 1301 development proposal was held on Wednesday, November 10th at 6 PM at Arts Park Circle in Hollywood outside. Amidst pouring rain, and nasty weather a crowd of 200 people showed up, and most of them were against the development proposal. There were some great speakers representing Friends of Hollywood, The Hollywood Historical Society, and multiple residents who sent the commissioners a message to listen to the people whose overwhelming majority do not support this project. Adriene Barmann and Sue Caruso from Broward Sierra Club were there as well, and they both voiced their opposition to the development. In the end we will see how the commissioners will vote. But one thing they all know: the Broward Sierra Club will be watching them....





#### NO private condo tower on Hollywood Public Beach

This incredible inspiration for our youth happened to Hollywood's environmental advocate Cat Uden, at the Hollywood Commissioner's Town Hall meeting on Wednesday, 11/10/2021. This meeting regarded the Commission's plan to allow developers to build a condo at 1301 S. Ocean Drive.

The Hollywood City Commission invites the community to an open forum where they can ask questions and share suggestions or concerns.

The quarterly Commission in the Community forums take place in each district of the City. Each meeting is facilitated by the District Commissioner for the area where the meeting is held. Commission in the Community begins with a welcome from Mayor Josh Levy followed by an open forum moderated by the hosting District Commissioner. This forum will be hosted by District 1 Commissioner Caryl Shubam.

6:00 - 6:30 pm Meet and greet with Commission members

6:30 - 8:00 pm Open forum with Commission members

Attendees wishing to speak will be asked to fill out a speaker's card and turn it in by 7 p.m. Lawn seating available, bring a lawn chair or blanket for comfort. Please follow CDC guidelines, wear a mask, and maintain a safe social distance. Singleuse plastics and Styrofoam containers are prohibited at the ArtsPark, including plastic bottles and bags.



"A lot of you were asking me who the boy was that up to the microphone to speak. He was a 5th grader rollerblading in the park with his friend, and he came up to me and asked me what was going on tonight. I told him that it's "Commission in the Community", and people who live in Hollywood can go up to the microphone and tell the mayor and commissioner things that they're concerned about in the city and also make suggestions. His eyes got big, and he excitedly told me, "Oh, I want to do that! I have some things to say."

I asked what he was concerned about, and he said he didn't like that they knocked down the Bread building. I asked why. He said because that building had been there his whole life. He said he also thought that rent is too high, and we need more apartments with lower rent.

He asked his friend to take notes in his phone so he could remember what to say. He also told me a story about how he was sad that he saw a homeless person be denied a room at a motel in town, even though he showed that he had money for the hotel room. He said that wasn't right. (What a caring kid).

I told him that residents could fill out a speaker card, and when they call your name, you can tell them your thoughts. So he did! He filled out a card, went up to the microphone, and voiced his concerns about affordable housing. Future mayor of Hollywood?"

#### **Broward Sierra Political Corner – December 2021**

We normally encourage our members each month to take action at the city, county, state, and federal levels, but right now we're in a CODE RED situation at the federal level and need EVERYONE to call their US Representative and Senators and insist that the Build Back Better Act (BBBA) be passed with every climate provision in place. Here's why ...

The infrastructure bill that just passed allocates \$47 billion to address the impacts of climate change. This is called climate adaptation. It does NOT, however, allocate anywhere near enough \$ to reduce what's causing the acceleration of climate change in the first place, most notably the burning of fossil fuels. This is called climate mitigation. The Build Back Better Act allocates \$555 billion for climate mitigation.

Call/e-mail/write/tweet Senators Rubio and Scott and your US Rep and tell them that you want them to pass the Build Back Act with all climate provisions intact because:

- 1. The climate investments in the BBBA put our nation on a clear path to cut pollution and carbon emissions.
- 2. The BBBA will reduce families' energy bills.
- 3. The BBBA will create millions of good-paying clean energy jobs and invest in communities that have historically borne the brunt of fossil fuel pollution.
- 4. When passed, it will be the most significant climate investment in our nation's history.
- 5. This is a code red moment for humanity and BBBA is our best, last chance to tackle the climate crisis and invest in our nation's clean energy future. We must LEAD on climate!
















# Nature Walk at Wakodahatchee and Green Cay Wetlands

When: January 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2022, Sunday

Palm Beach County offers us two opportunities, within two miles of each other, to learn about the great diversity of wildlife that constructed wetlands attract. We'll explore the 50-acre Wakodahatchee Wetlands, in West Delray Beach and the 100-acre Green Cay Wetlands, in Boynton Beach, both are 'Birder's Paradises'. Adriene, Broward Sierra's Outing Leader, will lead a nature walk and educate our participants about both wetland preserves, and discuss the importance of wetlands and their relationship to clean water. These unique habitats support a variety of plants, birds and wildlife that have evolved and thrived.

Each location provides accessible boardwalks (3/4 mile and 1.5 mile respectively), allowing for easy viewing of birds. We expect the trip to run from 9:30 a.m. until approximately 3:00 p.m. We ask that you bring your own lunch, which we'll break for, outdoors prior to traveling to our 2nd location Green Cay.
