The subject for this month: New Development Threatens Florida Panther Habitat in the Western Everglades

Speaker: Matt Schwartz, Executive Director of the South Florida Wildlands Association.

Mr. Schwartz has served as the Executive Director of the South Florida Wildlands Association since 2010. His local environmental work includes stewardship of South Florida's national parks and other public lands, opposition to oil drilling and other dirty energy projects in the Greater Everglades, and the protection of endangered wildlife, habitat, and wetlands.





Mr. Schwartz will explain the dangers these developments pose, where they are in the approval/ application process, and what we can do to fight them. A question-and-answer period will follow.

Some statistics on the ever-vanishing Florida panther:

- The Florida panther is the only mountain lion subspecies found east of the Mississippi River.
- An adult Florida panther needs to eat about 35–50 deer-sized animals each year, although females with cubs may need twice that amount. Besides white-tailed deer, Florida panthers may eat rabbits, wild hogs, birds, armadillos, rats, carrion, and grass.
- Today there are only 120 to 130 Florida panthers left in the wild. They are found in southern Florida in swamplands such as Everglades National Park and Big Cypress National Preserve.
- Florida panthers generally live between 8 and 15 years in the wild.
- The state recorded 27 panther deaths in 2019 and 30 in 2018.



Here is a summary:

When people think of vacationing in Florida, they generally think of theme parks in Orlando or Tampa, the Space Center, ports to cruise from, museums, and beaches on our 1200 miles of coastline (which are already being filled with Spring Breakers, and from the pictures I've seen, many seem to think the Covid danger has passed). Not as many seem to want to take advantage of the Florida State Parks:

There are 175 locations include nature reserves, recreation areas, and historic sites, and about 50 of them allow camping. These parks are where you see the *real* Florida, with the old growth trees that are hundreds of years old. Want to see manatees in their natural habitat (that aren't congregating outside power plants enjoying the warm water)? Try Silver Springs State Park, where we paddled amongst the pods:



The original plan was to go down the famous Juniper Springs canoe run, but at the last minute, someone spotted a Florida Black Bear, so we created an Emergency Backup Plan and headed 30 miles to the west for an even better paddling experience. The manatees kind of gave us the "Side-eye", but apparently they're used to sharing the river with other nature-lovers.

If you want to see alligators, plenty of those around as well (but we always keep a safe distance).



And we have so many bird varieties in Florida that we have outings dedicated solely for bird watching. We have been to:

- Blue Springs
- Juniper Springs
- Silver Springs (Florida has a lot of springs)\*
- Wakodahatchee wetlands

- Fisheating Creek
- Markham Park
- Turner River
- Corkscrew Swamp

So, consider joining us for one of future our outings. Adrienne and I make all the preparations, let you know all the costs in advance, plan all the meals with everyone's dietary restrictions taken into account, and make sure we all have a good time. We only go to campgrounds we trust (and they are near to civilization; no primitive campsites). We even have tents for those who don't. So think about joining us when we can get back out to the great outdoors again.
