The En-Roads Climate Simulator

The Paris Agreement's central aim is to strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change by keeping a global temperature rise this century well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase even further to 1.5 degrees Celsius.

The impacts of climate change haven't been spread evenly around our planet and they won't be in the future, either. Temperatures increase at different speeds everywhere. However, average global temperature rise, as stipulated in the Paris Agreement can be achieve through the appropriate changes in the way we live. The En-ROADS Climate Solution Simulator is a tool that provides policy-makers with ability to explore the impacts of policies or combination thereof on global temperatures.

The <u>En-ROADS Climate Solutions Simulator</u> is a fast, powerful climate simulation tool for understanding how we can achieve our climate goals through changes in energy, land use, consumption, agriculture, and other policies. The simulator focuses on how changes in global GDP, energy efficiency, technological innovation, and carbon price influence carbon emissions, global temperature, and other factors. It is designed to provide a synthesis of the best available science on climate solutions and put it at the fingertips of groups in policy workshops and roleplaying games. These experiences enable people to explore the long-term climate impacts of global policy and investment decisions. Conversely, the simulator allows for the exploration of the combination of policies that may allow the world to achieve the goals of the Paris Accord.

The model emphasizes the system-wide interactions of policies. Behind the simulation is an extensive study of the latest research literature on factors such as delay times, progress ratios, price sensitivities, historic growth of energy sources, and energy efficiency potential. This enables En-ROADS to reveal the dynamic interactions between different levers, such as how energy efficiency affects renewable energy, and which feedback loops are most significant.

The model will allow us, in an interactive setting, to play policy-makers for a night and to contemplate a combination changes to various components of the economy, such transportation, deforestation, the greater penetration of renewable energy sources, fee of carbon-based fuels, etc., and to observe the corresponding changes in global temperature at the end of the century.

En-ROADS is being developed by Climate Interactive, Ventana Systems, Todd Fincannon, UML Climate Change Initiative, and MIT Sloan.

The Coconut Creek Community Garden Project has been underway since last fall – happily with support from Broward Sierra. The City of Coconut Creek has designated a plot for the garden, and we've been reaching out to volunteers. Several students from Coconut Creek High School have been coming out to our monthly meetings in this regard. We're working with Coconut Creek's Parks and Recreation Department to plan out specifics regarding our partnership, and we hope to get started with the actual gardening later this spring.

This community garden project is in motion based on a several key objectives – to provide opportunities for people of all backgrounds and ages to cultivate this garden; to develop theories and praxis that manifest local ways that are also mindful of regional and global concerns that pertain to climate change and global warming; and to explore ways by which a garden – as a physical space and concept – can manifest goals that relate to civic engagement, environmental stewardship, democracy and the commons, and connections between nature and the arts.

CCCGP has been meeting monthly since January – with group discussions and guest speakers who have given presentations about permaculture, butterflies and butterfly gardens, beekeeping, intersections between gardens and the arts, and other topics.
