Wisconsin Wolf Update

Sierra members recently received an email from Executive Director of The Sierra Club, Michael Brune, asking for our help with the Wisconsin Wolf situation. A few weeks ago, the DNR published a recommendation for a quota of 130 wolves for the November 2021

wolf hunt. However, it is likely that the NRB will reject that recommendation and establish a much larger quota, largely because outgoing NRB president, Dr. Frederick Prehn, refuses to step down and allow Evers' appointee Sandy Naas to assume her new post. This is occurring against the backdrop of a federal lawsuit. Attorneys general in Michigan and Oregon have filed a joint amicus brief in litigation against the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, which alleges the federal government improperly removed gray wolf endangered species protection.

Back 40 Mine Update

Members of the <u>Save the Menominee River Coalition</u> or the Menominee Nation will update us on the Back 40 mine near the Menominee River between Wisconsin and Michigan. A proposed 750' deep open pit mine will produce 70 million tons of acid-producing rock and milled tailings. It threatens our cultural and environmental resources.



Natural Resources Board Update

At the time of this writing, The Wisconsin State Journal is reporting that outgoing Natural Resource Board president, Dr. Frederick Prehn, has yet to step down and is continuing to impact numerous decisions that we in Sierra Club know to be vital to protecting the rich natural heritage we enjoy in Wisconsin. On April 28th of this year, Gov. Tony Evers appointed Sandy Naas and Sharon Adams to the policy board to replace Prehn and Julie Anderson, who were appointed by former Gov. Scott Walker and whose sixyear terms expired May 1.

Adams joined the board in May after Anderson stepped down. But Prehn declined to leave, citing a Supreme Court ruling that allows appointees to stay on until a replacement is confirmed by the Senate (GOP leaders in the Senate have yet to refer either of Evers' new appointees to a committee for a confirmation hearing.) Without Naas, Republican appointees hold four of the board's seven seats as they take up controversial topics including the regulation of PFAS and the DNR's wolf management plan.

Please take a moment today to contact WI Attorney General Josh Kaul to ask him to insure that we have timely transfer of power as Prehn's presence undermines the sound, responsible and accountable management of natural resources held in public trust.
