Keller Ski Hut, built in 1938 is at an elevation of 6,800 feet on Highway 18 between Running Springs and Big Bear in the San Bernardino Mountains, across from Snow Valley Ski Area. There are two rustic living/dining rooms; fully equipped kitchen with cookware, dishes, utensils,



stove, refrigerator; two dormitory sleeping lofts with 30 sleeping pads on floors; and bathroom. And yes there is running water and electricity. Regular member fees run \$5 for day use and \$10 overnight – what a deal! But of course, fees are waived for volunteers.





Sprog Leadership Program a Big Winner

ight now, more young people than ever are stepping up to take on big polluters and advocate for just, sustainable solutions to the biggest challenges of today. This summer, more than a hundred youth will take part in our award-winning grassroots leadership program (called Sprog) to learn the skills they need to win real campaigns and see real results.

These trainings are run by, and for, young movement leaders, like me, and are appropriate for young people ages 14 and up. They don't have to be current students. They don't have to have previous organizing experience. The only requirements are a passion for the environment and an eagerness to lead.

For more than 20 years Sierra Club has been training and empowering young people through Sprog – equipping them with the skills, knowledge and confidence they need to win campaigns for sustainability, climate and justice.

I started "organizing" when I was a high school student, although I didn't know to call it that at the time, and I certainly didn't know how to make the change I envisioned for my community come to fruition the way that I do now. It wasn't until years had passed of lively but misguided meetings and rallies that I discovered that "organizing" was a practice that could be studied and

I feel so grateful now to play a role in connecting a new group of young people each year to the same timetested tools that helped change agents like Martin Luther King, Jr. and Cesar Chavez make their mark on the world.

ADVENTURE PASS SPECIAL NOTICE - Most outings occurring in the San Bernardino,

Angeles, Cleveland, or Los Padres National Forests require a Forest Service permit for each vehicle

(Adventure Pass). They are indicated by ** in the calendar. Be sure to contact the leader regarding

permits. The permits cost \$30 per year or \$5 per day; however they may not be obtainable the day

of your Outing. If you arrive at the meeting place without making arrangements with the leader

& you don't have a permit or find a ride in a vehicle with a permit, you will not be able to attend

the outing. You are expected to share the cost of the daily permits equally among everyone in the

vehicle or a suggested \$.50 contribution from everyone for annual permits (above normal mileage

contribution). America the Beautiful Interagency Passes may be used in lieu of Adventure Pass.

CARPOOLING POLICY - In the interests of facilitating the logistics of some outings, it is

customary that participants make carpooling arrangements. The Sierra Club does not have insurance

for carpooling arrangements & assumes no liability for them, Carpooling, ride sharing, or anything



The city of Moreno Valley released the final environmental impact report (FEIR) for the proposed The Moreno Valley Group, Sierra Club information table at World Logistics Center (WLC) project on May 1 and comments Photo by Ann McKibben on the FEIR (documents can be

found at http://www.moreno-valley.ca.us/misc/wlc-deir.shtml) were accepted for 45 days. A city planning commission meeting was scheduled for June 11 to hear comments from the public on the project. In mid-May one of the city councilmembers proposed that a ballot measure be put forward to let the public vote to decide whether the project should be approved. Discussion of that proposal was planned for the June 9 city council meeting. A May *Press Enterprise* article discussed issues regarding the city's negotiations with the developer of the WLC project and says the project developer has asked the city to contribute \$100 million for infrastructure improvements (streets, sidewalks, etc.). The WLC is probably the most controversial project proposed for Moreno Valley and the Inland metropolitan area. The 40.6 million square foot project (the size of 700 full-sized football fields) will have severe impacts - increase in freeway traffic, truck traffic (approximately 69,000 vehicle trips per day), air quality (asthma, respiratory diseases). If built, it would share a two-mile border with the San Jacinto Wildlife Area, home to threatened/endangered species as well as more than 20 species of raptors. Please plan on attending planning

The Riverside County Transportation Commission approved the proposed Mid County Parkway (MCP), a sixteen-mile, six-lane freeway from Perris (I-215) to the city of San Jacinto (Highway 79) and would cost approximately \$1.7 billion. The project would displace almost 400 individuals and also displace businesses that employee approximately 170 individuals. The proposed project also has to undergo National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) review. The Center for Biological Diversity, Sierra Club, San Bernardino Valley Audubon Society, Friends of the Northern San Jacinto Valley and Friends of Riverside's Hills are suing to stop or downsize the project and make sure it complies with the law. Issues: impacts to low income minority neighborhoods, impacts to wildlife (San Jacinto Wildlife Area), loss of prime agricultural lands, urban sprawl, air pollution. Making the road safer is one thing; but creating a major freeway through rural areas, displacing low income residents, businesses, and eliminating agricultural lands is problematic.

Riverside County General Plan Update (GPU): Riverside County has recirculated the GPU and Climate Action Plan (CAP) Draft Environmental Impact Report. The county is preparing responses to comments and was scheduled to start public outreach meetings in June (even though they will still be working on responses). Please try to attend. 

2015 Young Environmental Champion Awards

or the third year in a row, the Chapter is recognizing a group of young people who are, indeed, environmental champions and who are bringing recognition to the environmental problems that their community faces. All of these students are part of the GrEAT/Sierra Alliance. "GrEAT" is the Green Energy and Technology Academy at Desert Mirage High School in the eastern Coachella Valley. This school serves a community that is one of the most heavily impacted areas in our Chapter. They face huge problems of air quality, pesticide use and oppressing poverty, just to name a few of the environmental justice issues in this area.

With the support of the Sierra Club, these students have travelled by bus to Sacramento this year to testify regarding the EPA's proposed 60ppb "smog rule." This meant leaving Thermal at 1:00 am on one day and getting back at 5:00 am the following day. By all accounts, those in attendance found their testimony riveting and one EPA official was quoted as saying, "in the 20+ years that I've worked for the EPA, I've never been more moved by testimony in a public hearing." Most of them have made several trips to Diamond Bar to testify at Southern California Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) Board. All but Jose and Marina were presented with Environmental Justice



Supervisor Benoit, a member of the SCAQMD Board, was so impressed he brought District staff to come meet with them and Assemblyman Eduardo Garcia came to address a full assembly at the High School. Most of this year's awardees have applied for this year's Sprog, the summer environmental leadership program that is put on by the Sierra Student Coalition, and Marina Barragán has been tapped as a trainer for the program this year. They are truly making a difference and we expect all of them to continue as champions for the environment as they move on to the next phases of their lives. 


This year, our theme is about leaving



Come Along on Our "Everest Base Camp Trek" **Set for August 4th Chapter Meeting**

dventurer and traveler Jim Vanderaa will share with us photos and video clips of his incredible trek to Mt. Everest Base Camp in October 2014. With only himself and his Sherpa guide,

from the summit of Gokyo Ri (17,575'), traversing Cho La Pass (17,782') in snowstorm, the Everest sunset from the summit of Kala Patthar (18,514'), Everest Base Camp (17,598') and Nangkartshang

Peak (16,732'). Jim will also show his photos and videos of Kathmandu prior to the city's devastation in the earthquake this April.

Jim tells us that this trek is far more accessible than people realize - physically, logistically, and economically. He encourages others to make a trek. He will provide valuable tips to anyone thinking about this challenging adventure.
