he March 7 San Gorgonio Chapter meeting features Ben Wickham, Membership and Outreach Coordinator for Friends of the Inyo, a conservation organization based in Bishop, California, and founded in 1986.

From the top of Mt. Whitney down to Death Valley, from Owens Lake to the Bodie Hills, and many places in between, Friends of the Inyo connects thousands of people to their public lands each year through hikes, tours, volunteer opportunities,

Ben took the first job out of college that allowed him to work in the mountains. That summer at Merced Lake in the Yosemite Wilderness convinced him that mountains are where he should be. He migrated between Yosemite, Idaho, Montana, and the Eastern Sierra, working in the tourism

industry to afford himself the opportunity to explore high alpine terrain on skis, deep forests by foot, and rapid rivers by kayak. Over time, Ben discovered that he wanted to do more to help people engage with the landscape around them. He taught at the University of Idaho's McCall Outdoor Science School while receiving a masters degree in natural resources with an emphasis in environmental education at the university. his attention away from ratings, popularity and posturing. It would be easy to throw up our hands and head for the hills.

As I write this on Feb 2 though, I am encouraged. Today, a horrible bill designed to sell off public lands to the highest bidder is pulled because of constituent outrage. The candidate for Secretary of Education may be denied confirmation with a couple of Republican Senators choosing right



over partisanship. After nationwide protests, a brave Federal Judge stayed the immigration and travel ban. Where this will end up by mid-March when you receive this, I don't know.

What I do know, is that action works. Congress Members and Senators want most of all to be re-elected. If their constituents are

loud, focused, consistent and involved, partisanship is trumped by the democratic process. Voices that were silent in the past are becoming vocal and learning how to affect change.

GENERAL INFORMATION/RULES/ **DISCLAIMERS**

All Outings Leaders are Chapter Certified Leaders having appropriate Outings Training Courses, First Aid Courses, and experience for the Outings they lead. Leaders may exclude individuals from participation if they

believe they may not be qualified. Non-Sierra Club members may join outings unless otherwise stated in the write-up. All participants agree to abide by the Leader's rules. Participants should CALL THE LEADER AHEAD TO SIGN-UP. Many Outings specify items to be carried by EACH participant. Do not attend Outings without the specified items unless you have first discussed it with the leader. Often the **TEN ESSENTIALS** are required. They are: 1) Map 2) Compass 3) Flashlight 4) Knife 5) Windproof/waterproof matches in waterproof case 6) Fire starter 7) First aid kit 8) Extra food and water for emergency use only 9) Extra clothing including rainwear 10) Sun protection including sunscreen/sunglasses/hat. Carpooling is encouraged, but solely the responsibility of individual participants. The Sierra Club and its leaders may facilitate carpooling, however they will not assign. Drivers should have adequate insurance coverage and their vehicle should have no safety defects. For Sierra Club facilitated carpooling, drivers agree to not consume any alcoholic beverages. It is customary for riders to share expenses with the driver. The above information applies to Sierra Club Outings and Activities only. Non-Sierra Club activities may be listed in a separate location as a courtesy. Please be sure to read the disclaimer that accompanies

** ADVENTURE PASS SPECIAL NOTICE

Outings occurring in the San Bernardino, Angeles, Cleveland, or Los Padres National Forests may require a Forest Service "Adventure Pass" for each vehicle. The Forest Service designates where the passes are required. Generally, areas that have developed parking and may include toilet facilities, interpretive signs and trash cans require passes and unimproved areas do not require passes. Outings that require passes usually will be preceded by ** in the listings that follow and/ or the leader may indicate the need for Adventure Passes. While leaders try to provide accurate information, ultimately it is the vehicle's driver that assumes responsibility to adhere to all rules, regulations, and laws - not the Sierra Club. The permits cost \$30 per year or \$5 per day; however, they may not be obtainable the day of your outing. As a passenger, you are expected to share some of the cost of the daily passes along with a mileage contribution along with the others in the vehicle. Golden Eagle Passports and Golden Age Passports may be used in lieu or the Adventure Pass.

Déjà vu 1982

A ll Federal and State elections have environmental consequences. Unless we are proactive, we will lose our protected national and state parks, and the public lands. The changes may open these cherished nation heritages to commercial exploitation. These actions would be nicely couched in mantra of creating job, or energy-independence using the natural resources (oil, gas, coal and minerals such as uranium) located on the public lands

I remember it well! As our previous experience during 1967 to 1975 in California, and then again during January 1982 to 1989 indicates, the institutions that have protected our air and water (EPA), labor safety (OSHA), and our national forests and public lands (Department of Interior) all will be made ineffective by cutting their budgets, eliminating the important regulations such as 40CFR Code of Federal Regulations, and by reducing their technical staff. The assault on the institutions of higher education and the intellectual cadre of our society was the low mark of the 1982-1989 periods.

We may argue against the outcome of the 2016 election. But, why the Electoral College elected this President and the public elected a larger assembly of environmental antagonists for the Congress and governorship? Where did we go wrong? But, for now, we can't back down; we have to protect our air, water and our public lands.

Transportation

The transportation corridor from Ontario to San Diego has exceeded the highway carrying capacity. Increasing the number of lanes will briefly alter the present congestion and but will only increase air pollution problems. The population of the southern California has been increasing for decades. It will increase because of demand for new developments.

To remedy the problem, jointly we must expand both the existing mass-transit system and create rapid electric trains from Ontario to San Diego. The train tracks could be placed between the north and south bound traffics on Highway15. This option would be cost-effective, would reduce commuter travel time; but more importantly, it will reduce the impact of noxious exhaust on public health by improving the air quality in Temecula valley.

Members of the Transportation Task Group from the Santa Margarita Sierra Club have regularly attended the monthly Transportation-Now conference of the Riverside Transit Agency. We are looking forward to working with Joseph Morabito, representing the Southwest Transportation-Now group, to advance the expansion of Mass-transit system within the Southern California region.

World Logistics Center (WLC): A coalition of environmental groups (San Bernardino Valley Audubon Society, Center for Biological Diversity, Sierra Club and other groups) are being represented by Earthjustice. The appeal hopes to reverse the decision of a Riverside County Superior Court judge who denied the request by the coalition to block two Moreno Valley city initiatives which may allow the city to circumvent state environmental laws in analyzing the environmental impacts of the WLC project

Villages of Lakeview (VOL): Comments on the draft environmental impact report were submitted last fall by the Center for Biological Diversity (CBD) and Shute, Mihaly

Some of our concerns include GPA 960's impact on greenhouse gases, agricultural lands and the San Jacinto Wildlife Area's at-risk species as well as promoting sprawl.

Mid County Parkway: The California Environmental Quality Act hearing is scheduled to be heard on June 9, 2017, at 9:30 a.m., Dept.10 of the Riverside Superior Court, downtown Riverside. The National Environmental Policy Act hearing is scheduled for Monday, March 6, 2017, 8:30 a.m. in the U.S. District Court for the Central District

of California in downtown Los Angeles.

Tuniper Flats Restoration Grant

The BLM (Bureau of Land Management) received a grant from the OHMVR (Off Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation) Division of State Parks. This restoration grant is expected to restore six sites in Arrastre Canyon. These are sites that have been disturbed by vehicles being driven off the designated route. On Saturday, January 28, 2017, nine volunteers joined the BLM and USFS staff members to complete restoration beside the open motorcycle route JF3355M just off Powerline Road. This area called Juniper Flats is



south of Apple Valley in the San Bernardino Mountain foothills and can be accessed with a high clearance or 4x4 vehicle from Milpas Dr (from Hwy 18). Friends of Juniper Flats set up a table with information about the

Juniper Flats Working Group and some snacks. One volunteer remained at the table to outreach to visitors who stopped by to explain what the project is all about and to solicit help. Other volunteers provided labor to complete 'vertical mulching' on the closed route. Vertical Mulching is a method of planting mostly dead branches to make the "trail" disappear and look like the surrounding desert landscape. We hope our efforts

will help encourage riders to remain on the designated signed routes. BLM is also installing numerous kiosks and interpretive signs to help riders become more aware of the damage done when they ride off the route. Much remains to be accomplished as there are over 200 active "incursions" (places where riders have gone off the designated route) in Arrastre Canyon. February 24-26 Kiavah Wilderness: Pacific Crest Trail

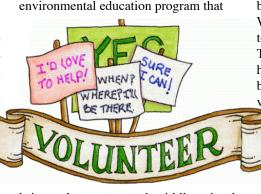

Results of Recent South Coast Air Quality Management (SCAQMD) Meeting

Sierra Club's My Generation Campaign organizers, volunteers and supporters came out in droves to fight for clean air at the South Coast Air Quality Management District hearing on Friday Feb. 3rd. The Board was scheduled to vote on a major smog reduction plan and they finally voted 9-3 to postpone the vote until the March 3rd meeting, due to absence of one of the members and all the testimony from Sierra Club activists and many others. Concern about pollution from ports, warehouses and refineries were raised by residents from the Inland Empire, Long Beach, Porter Ranch areas and the entire geography served by SCAQMD.

"We can't have any more children, or people, or our community hurting from the health impacts of this pollution," said Marina Barragán, a Sierra Club organizer who held up a photo of her 4-year-old nephew at the hospital for an asthma attack.

This delay will allow another month to review aspects of the plan of concern. Some members of the Board have suggested improvements, with possible amendments to add regulation after one year if voluntary improvement does not happen.

The most controversial topic was this voluntary approach for improving ports, warehouses and rail yards. My Generation Activists, along with concerned citizens from throughout Southern California, are skeptical that a voluntary approach will work. Funding incentives to businesses for voluntary improvements moves the cost from the pollution-causing sources to residents through potential tax increases.

Thanks to the over 300 Sierra Club volunteers and other concerned residents for taking time away from school, work and busy schedules to attend and testify at this important meeting.



Celebrate the Walk on Blue Mountain Now for the Tenth Annual Year ...Goal of year-round access to peak nearing a reality!

he 10th anniversary of the Walk on Blue Mountain will be held Sunday, March 5th at 8:00 a.m. Recent rain, great views and the promise of abundant wildflowers make March ideal for hiking up this private and normally closed Inland Empire mountain. The 1.6 mile hike to the top provides spectacular views in all directions both on the way up and at its 2,428 foot summit. The trailhead at the intersection of Palm Avenue

and Honey Hill Drive in Grand Terrace is easily freeway accessible from all points in the IE.

Begun 10 years ago by the Friends of Blue Mountain and assisted by the Sierra Club the goal of opening up this hidden treasure to the public has now been adopted by the City of Grand Terrace. With the Design Report

completed for the Blue Mountain Nature Trail, the city already has the \$200,000 matching funds needed to complete the project. A grant request is being processed by California Department of Parks and Recreation Habitat Conservation Fund Program for the other 50% needed funding.

There is no charge to participate and ample parking is available at the gates and down Palm Avenue at Azure Hills Church and the City Hall parking lot. Participants should arrive early as the starting window to begin is between 8:00 and 10:45 a.m.



Remember to bring water, a hat, sunscreen and at least a windbreaker for the always breezy top. Sturdy footwear is a must! And don't forget your camera.

Pets are allowed but must remain on a leash. But dogs aren't the only animal friends usually on the mountain as the event is a favorite with llama owners. And for those looking for a scenic change in venue, a church service will be held at the top.

Extreme interest in this trail as evidenced by participation of up to 800 folks in past years led to the

City of Grand Terrace adopting this project. Ultimately the park entrance will be accessible from a 20-acre city-owned parcel that will provide a direct trailhead along with parking,

For those unfamiliar with the location, take the 215 Freeway to the City of Grand Terrace and exit East on Barton Road; proceed uphill until Barton begins to veer left. Continue straight on Palm Ave. to the top where Palm meets Honey Hill Drive – you have arrived.
