# Southeastern PA Group (SPG) Conservation Committees

2017 Year-End Report

Prepared by Jim Wylie, SPG Conservation Chair, with input from 13 Conservation Committee Leaders

## Introduction

SPG has many conservation committees with various levels of organization, active leadership and collaboration with other organizations. In totality more than 50 volunteers have played a role in taking action or helping to increase awareness about environmental issues or opportunities in the greater Philadelphia region or beyond.

#### **Conservation Committees**

Committees covered in this report include:

- Ready For 100 teams in each of 5 counties
- PennEast Pipeline and Delaware River Water Quality
- Mariner East 2 Pipeline
- Bishop Tube Land and Water Contamination
- Public Lands and Utah Wilderness
- Fossil Free SEPTA

- Open Space Preservation

There are a few other conservation issues that are being worked on by our volunteers, but no contribution was made available for this year-end report: Urban Air Quality, ELCON Hazardous Waste Plant, Defense of EPA.

Most of the committees listed above are being worked on in collaboration with other environmental organizations. Only the Ready For 100 projects are made up of primarily of Sierra Club volunteers.

#### Budget - Summary

There may still be some reimbursement requests outstanding. We spent more than we predicted at the beginning of the year, but this was only for projects that we knew had additional funding from grants and targeting fundraising. Our surplus funding (about \$4,600) can be applied to the 2018 conservation budget. [see detailed <u>budget info</u> in later section]

#### Top 3 Takeaways

The three biggest things we would like the reader to get out of this report are:

- 1. Advocating for solutions, like renewable energy with 35+ volunteers, is by far the biggest motivator for our volunteers. The well-organized leadership and resources from the national Ready For 100 team is also a major contributor to success.
- 2. There is an opportunity to support and organize around other issues. The tone and impact of a committee is very much dependent on the skills and motivation of the volunteer leader(s) and the push/pull of organizing support is different for each team.
- 3. **2017** was a banner year for volunteer activity. A wave of people raised their hands to volunteer with the Sierra Club in the greater Philadelphia area. **But** few have emerged as organizing leaders and some of the initial enthusiasm after Nov 8, 2016 has melted away or shifted to follow organizations that have more local structure and direction.

## **Other Observations**

- 1. We should follow the lead of Don't Spray Me, Open Space and Water Pollution committees to look for opportunities to connect conservation issues with outings, education and social events.
- 2. A "conservation committee" is loosely defined. Sometimes it is all SC volunteers. Sometimes lead by and SC volunteer with collaboration w/ other orgs. Sometimes SC is a minor player in a multi-org committee, but the resources and branding of an SC connection are always welcome.
- 3. We did not do a good job of predicting our budget needs for 2017.
- 4. It should be noted that many volunteers spend their own money for small printing, food contributions at gatherings, etc. This is surely appreciated and recognized as part of our volunteer resource.

# **Conservation Committee Reports**

#### PennEast and the Delaware river

Objective: to stop the PennEast pipeline, but also, to institute a permanent and complete ban on fracking and fracking related activities in the entire Delaware river Basin area throughout all four states.

In 2017 we have spoke on these issues at rallies and meetings, have written letters to the editor, have addressed the press about these issues on several occasions, have partaken of actions in Harrisburg with Governor Wolf about these issues.

In 2018 we plan to continue working on getting Resolutions in front of all Bucks County municipalities along the River and beyond to enact a permanent ban on fracking and all fracking related activities, if they have not already done so.

## **Bishop Tube PA Hazardous Site**

A coalition of community members living near a severely contaminated, old industrial site (TCE and heavy metals) organized to protest a developer's plan to partially mediate the site with Pennsylvania tax-money grant, and build over 200 homes on the site. The extent of contamination includes bedrock, soil, groundwater, and the Little Valley Creek that flows to an Exception Value stream, Valley Creek. Progress was to get the support of the E. Whiteland Township supervisors and Senator A. Dinniman to withdraw their support for the grant to the developer. Also, a SLAPP suit by the developer to stop those from speaking about this, was stopped by Chester County Court; an appeal by the developer was also rejected.

Objective: To inform the residents of Chester County of the risks to their health, safety and environment associated with the Mariner East 2 project and to prevent further pipelines from crossing our County.

As a direct result of the above forum East Goshen Safety and Environmental Advocates was formed. We have our own website and newsletter.

Om 2018 we will continue to keep the public aware of the

Hopefully the grants I have received from the State chapter will be renewed. ## **Public Lands and Utah Wilderness**

## **FossilFree SEPTA**

Prevent SEPTA from building a gas-fired power plant in Philadelphia, and speed up SEPTA's transition to electric buses, powered by clean energy.

Members of the campaign have spoken at almost every SEPTA monthly board meeting; numerous rallies, phone and post card campaigns; petition with 500+ signatures; letters of opposition to SEPTA by several elected officials.

This campaign is led by 350.org, I have been assisting on behalf of Sierra Club, and communicating about the campaign with ExCom, and local volunteers via emails and the quarterly newsletter.

For 2018 we will continue to put pressure on Air Management Services to deny the final needed permit for the gas plant; move the conversation with SEPTA from "we are committed to purchasing 525 more diesel-hybrid buses over the next 5 years" to a position of willingness to make the later year buses electrics, and to setting aggressive renewable energy targets.

Chapter and SPG support as is already being provided.

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#### **Transportation**

Advocate for alternative transportation modes & zero emission vehicles, zero emission buses at SEPTA; pedestrian safety (Vision Zero); traffic law enforcement (including electronic speed and red-light enforcement)

## **Water Pollution/Outings**

Southeast PA service and citizen science outings.

In 2017 we organized Marine Restoration. Participate in International Marine Debris Clean-up day by working on the Heinz NWR to remove all human made objects from the tidal marsh. Created inventory of all debris removed and submitted to Ocean Conservancy international database.

In 2017 I led an outing that combined kayaking, citizen science, and service for the Heinz National Wildlife Refuge during International Marine Debris week. A hearty group of Sierra Club volunteers (14 in all) joined with the rangers (3) of the Fish and Wildlife Service to pick up garbage, with kayaks provided by L. L. Bean. Data was sent to Ocean Conservancy and combined into the international database. Other related outings will be planned for the next year.

In 2018 we plan to have more service and citizen science outings.

Help from SPG and chapter organizers would be appreciated with broadcasting of the events to maximize volunteer participation which is particularly important for service outings.

#### **Open Space Preservation**

To advocate for greater open space protection by municipal governments in our region and to increase public awareness of the necessity of doing so.

In 2017 we will announce soon that 175 acres of forest in the center of Delaware County will be permanently preserved. The "Don Guanella Woods" in Marple Township will most likely become a county park in Delco. Another group I work with, Neighbors for Crebilly, has grown in just one year to over 2,000 likes on facebook and 500 email address. We have several fundraisers and this year at different venues, including "Paint Chester County" at Galer Winery in November.

In 2018 we hope to Save Crebilly Farm and make it a county park for Chesco.

From SPG and chapter organizers we need help to make the Crebilly story become national news. Since it's part of the Brandywine Battlefield and the most iconic farm in eastern Chester County, any help the PA chapter could offer to help


We have a need for volunteers with specific skills, like graphic design, more block captains in nearby communities and we have identified needs for about \$2,000 for yard signs, public events and rallies.

## Ready For 100

Ready For 100 actually has layers of organization in the SPG area. It has evolved significantly through 2017. As of December, we have a structure that looks roughly like this:



The **Ready For 100 national team** provides training, advice, communications resources, expert resources and references and are generally available when needed. They are available to communicate with team leaders at any level and encourage an open minded and inclusive process, realizing that every city is different and every volunteer committee has different skills and needs. In addition to the team in Oakland, Eva Resnick-Day, an RF100 national staffer in Pittsburgh, has been available for consult and has helped with PA coordination calls.

The **chapter coordination from Tom Torres** offer general organizing advice and resources. Tom has been especially available to help with organizing the large team in Philadelphia.

Jim Wylie provides some of the glue that is needed to do local organizing and volunteer building. Jim also helps with incubation of new teams and promotes the RF100 projects at regional events. Jim also manages the digital resources: web pages, shared folders, conference calls, etc.



We need help from SPG or chapter support for a new local-tome event to drum up local supporters outside of the Sierra reach. Public Outreach.






