We've got the receipts

During the 2022 legislative session, Sierra Club told you that Indiana legislators are putting Hoosiers on a dangerous path, refusing to listen to our urgent concerns about climate change and the need for greater access to renewable energy. Instead, they are pursuing false, risky and expensive schemes on behalf of special interests in exchange for our health, environment, financial security and collective futures.

The climate crisis has reached "code red for humanity," according to the latest United Nations climate report¹. Climate change is already resulting in increased extreme rain events, reduced agricultural production, and more intense droughts and heatwaves in Indiana.

This scorecard will show you whether your legislator supports real climate solutions or false ones. With two-thirds of the Indiana legislature earning a D or an F, and the average grade at a D+, it is likely — infuriatingly — the latter.

The legislature is out of step with the concerns of everyday Hoosiers. A recent Audubon Society survey² found that 78% of Hoosiers believe that climate change is a threat. Nearly three-quarters of voters (74%), regardless of party or political orientation, favor expanding the use of renewable energy in Indiana. In fact, 75% of Hoosiers, including an overwhelming majority of Republicans, Independents and Democrats, support net metering, a policy that fairly compensates customers, usually those with rooftop solar panels, for the energy they sell back to the electrical grid. And 70% of Hoosiers believe state government should do more to expand the use of solar power.

As one of the worst states in the U.S. for carbon pollution³, Indiana has a critical role to play in creating climate solutions. We can avoid the worsening impacts of climate change on our communities and our collective futures with cleaner air and water and lower energy costs. We can generate our own energy and take back power from monopoly utilities. We can ensure that the energy transition is an equitable one that benefits everyday Hoosiers, and not just special interests.

We have the climate solutions. What we need is a legislature that puts people before special interests and takes action that is so urgently needed.

We hope this scorecard will empower you to hold your legislators accountable.

About the Indiana General Assembly

The Indiana General Assembly is the legislative body and one of three co-equal branches of Indiana State Government. The primary role of the Indiana General Assembly is to enact laws governing the state of Indiana.

There are two chambers in the General Assembly (House of Representatives and Senate). The House of Representatives has 100 members elected to two year terms. The Senate has 50 members elected to four year terms. Every citizen in Indiana has one member representing you in the State House of Representatives and one member representing you in the State Senate.

In order for a proposed piece of legislation to become law it must pass both the House and Senate at the Indiana General Assembly during a legislative session. The legislation must also overcome a Governor veto should the Governor of Indiana decide to veto a bill that arrives on their desk from the Indiana General Assembly.

Extra Credit on Legislation not receiving a vote

Bills introduced during the legislative session aren't guaranteed a vote at the Indiana General Assembly. However, many legislators introduce or co-author bills to tackle environmental issues like climate change, coal ash cleanup, and renewable energy.

That's why, while many bills did not get a vote we did add extra credit points to the overall score for legislators who introduced or co-authored environmental legislation we supported. While legislators did not receive a vote on bills for us to score we wanted to reflect their leadership on environmental policy in Indiana. Extra Credit scores are reflected in their "Overall Environmental Grade".

Conservation Policy Bill Summaries

2015 - SJR 12 - Right to Farm and Ranch Sierra Club position: Opposed

Would have enshrined the right to engage in harmful agricultural practices in the State Constitution.

2016 - HB 1082 - No More Stringent Than Sierra Club position: Opposed

Would have made it impossible for the Indiana Dept of Environmental Management and the Department of Natural Resources to create rules more stringent than those set by the EPA.

2017 - HB 1494 - Regulation of Confined Feeding Operations Sierra Club position: Opposed

Would have made it impossible for the Indiana Dept of Environmental Management and the Department of Natural Resources to create rules more stringent than those set by the EPA.

2021 - SB 389 - Repeal of Wetlands Protections Sierra Club position: Opposed

Eliminated protection for Class I wetlands and significantly reduced protection for Class II wetlands.

2021 - SB 141 - Public Transit Sierra Club position: Opposed

Would have prevented IndyGo from moving forward with two new bus rapid transit routes.

2022 - HB 1100 - No More Stringent Than Sierra Club position: Opposed

Would have made it impossible for state regulators to create rules more stringent than those set at the federal level.

Sustainable Energy Policy Bill Summaries

2014 - SB 340 - Energizing Indiana Repeal Sierra Club position: Opposed

In 2014, the Indiana General Assembly repealed Energizing Indiana, an energy efficiency program that created jobs, reduced energy consumption and saved customers money on their energy bills.

2017 - SB 309 - Rooftop Solar Repeal Sierra Club position: Opposed

Monopoly utility effort to steal the economic benefits of solar energy from customers who are generating it and make rooftop solar unaffordable.

2019 - SB 472 Amendment 1 - Renewable Energy Ban Sierra Club position: Supported

Removed the language establishing a "renewable energy ban" or moratorium on new power plants, power contracts and changes to fuel sources.

2019 - HB 1470 - Blank Check Sierra Club position: Opposed

Monopoly utility effort to pass along their costs to consumers with little to no oversight. Undermines the longstanding system where utilities must justify their rate increases in a public forum with a chance for consumers to speak up and push back.

2022 - SB 271 - Small Modular Nuclear Reactors Sierra Club position: Opposed

Forces everyday Hoosiers to pay for construction of unproven, risky small modular nuclear reactors, even if they never go online.

2022 - HB 1209 - Carbon Capture and Sequestration Sierra Club position: Opposed

Opens the state of Indiana to the development of CO2 pipelines and storage wells and encourages the continued burning of coal when we need to be eliminating emissions. Shifts liability for any accidents to Hoosier tax payers rather than companies.

Extra Credit Legislation

2022 - SB 255/HB 1287 - Climate Task Force Sierra Club position: Supported

Bills that would have established a Climate Task Force to study climate change and produce a report to guide Indiana's response to climate change.
