Fracking Presentation: Tuesday, October 8, 7-8 p.m.

Chris Johnson is a writer based in the Chicago area who has co-authored a new book, Forests for the People: The Story of America's Eastern National Forests, published by Island Press. Also a Sierra Club member, he's presenting about hydraulic fracturing; "Hydraulic Fracturing on Eastern National Forests: A Growing Threat," featuring numerous photographs. Chris believes that the presentation will provide valuable context to our members because of the environmental impact fracking and sand mining could have on Iowa. The presentation is based on a chapter in the book about the environmental impact of natural-gas drilling on the Allegheny National Forest in western Pennsylvania. He recently made similar presentations to the Northwest Cook County Group and the Piasa Palisades Group of the Illinois Sierra Club. He was also interviewed recently on the program Lake Effect on Milwaukee Public Radio.

This program is co-sponsored by Linn County Conservation and will be held at the Wickiup Hill Outdoor Learning Center. If you haven't been there since their expansion, you should plan to come early and take a quick tour of the new facilities as well.

'Remember Hurricane Sandy" Climate Campaign Underway

One of the challenges with climate change issue is that it's so big, people often do not know where to begin. A simple thing anyone can do to help: call Congress October 22 thru October 28 and ask our Congressional representatives to "Remember Hurricane Sandy" by taking action and fight climate change.

To deal effectively with climate change, we need American leadership on a global basis. Meaning, we need Congress to support climate action now and to sustain that action over many decades.

Hurricane Sandy was a transforming moment in American history, Americans saw an unprecedented late October storm bring record storm surges through downtown New York City and across much of the East Coast. It killed Americans, ruined homes and businesses, destroyed public infrastructure and cost our country more than \$70 billion, or more than \$200 per American.

It is not the only climate disaster we have experienced recently, but it is the biggest - the second most costly disaster in American history behind only Hurricane Katrina in 2005. If Hurricane Sandy does not get our Congressional representatives to take action on climate change, what is it going to take? Are we going to wait until the water rises through New York City permanently?

The first anniversary of Hurricane Sandy is an opportunity to remind Congress about the cost of inaction and the need for action. There are many things Congress could do right now to help the fight against climate change, including stopping the Keystone pipeline, making the renewable energy tax credit permanent and investing in infrastructure to guard against future climate disasters. Winter Outing: Friday through Sunday, February 7-9

Our Sierra Winter Outing will be at Backbone cabins again, this year from Febuary 7-9. Once again this year the White Pine group, out of Dubuque, is going to rent the cabin next to ours and we are looking forward to getting to know them even better.

Our Winter Outing is in posh Cabin #9 at Backbone State Park, near Strawberry Point- about an hour from CR. The cabins are two-story, heated, have a stove/oven, refrigerator, microwave, pots and pans, a shower- and best of all- Beds. There are "beds" for a total of 9 people each night, and a few more can sleep on their own cots/pads, for a maximum of 12 people each night. Early registrants will be given sleeping priority, so write me back and reserve your bed asap.

It's \$20 per night, or (\$30 for both nights) per person, for lodging. You'll need to bring your own sleeping bag/bedding and towels. Cabin #9 at Backbone has a great view of the lake, and we'll be planning on snowshoeing, x-country skiing, hiking, etc, depending on the weather. Bring your appropriate equipment. We can get in any time after 4 on Friday, and we need to be out by 1 p.m. on Sunday.

Directions: Only the south entrance is open. From CR, you just go North on Highway 13, through Manchester, and continue north to E64 where you'll turn left (west) and go to Dundee. This road will curve north into town, then you continue North on W69 which takes you to the park. Once you turn into the park, you take a quick right to go up to the cabins. If you end up in the outdoor camping area (like we all did the first year) then you need to loop around and come back down and go left just before you get back to the main road.

Food: we usually just kind of do our own deal on Friday night and Saturday lunch (with lots of sharing). We will provide Saturday Breakfast, and Sunday Breakfast. We will also provide our entree for Saturday night. If the rest of you could bring a side/salad/desert, then that should about do it.
