CONSERVATION CORNER

Idle No More!

A friend invited me to an Idle No More Round Dance Flash Mob event. I had never heard of Idle No More, so I did what most people would do and Googled it. According to their website (link at end of article), it's a movement begun by four indigenous women from Canada who shared a vision of bringing people together to create ways to protect "Mother Earth, her lands, waters and people." These women discussed legislation that affected the environment and indigenous people. They began with taking action on the Bill C-45, which attacked the land base that had been reserved for the Canada's indigenous people. These women worked to empower other communities to stand up to this bill, and in doing so created the movement now known as Idle No More.

Idle No More's mission, according to their website, "calls on all people to join in a revolution which honors and fulfills Indigenous sovereignty which protects the land and water. Colonization continues through attacks to Indigenous rights and damage to the land and water. We must repair these violations, live the spirit and intent of the treaty relationship, work towards justice in action, and protect Mother Earth. On December 10th, Indigenous people and allies stood in solidarity across Canada to assert Indigenous sovereignty and begin the work towards sustainable, renewable development. All people will be affected by the continued damage to the land and water and we welcome Indigenous and non-Indigenous allies to join in creating healthy sustainable communities. We encourage youth to become engaged in this movement as you are the leaders of our future. There have always been individuals and groups who have been working towards these goals- Idle No More seeks to create solidarity and further support these goals. We recognize that there may be backlash, and encourage people to stay strong and united in spirit."

I participated in the Racine Round Dance Flash Mob on February 17. The focus was on the mining bill and the effects

a mine in the Penokee Range would have. We met in the parking lot of Target, where the man who had organized the meeting informed us of how things would be run. He told us that, as soon as mall security asked us to leave, we would immediately stop. He said if we could not comply with this important rule, we should not participate. We then made our way to the Regency Mall food court area, and we remained inconspicuous until we heard the drumming. When men began playing the Native American drum and chanting, we gathered around them and began to dance in a circle with our signs, flags, or just ourselves. There were passersby that inquired as to what we were doing, so it was a great opportunity for participants who were on the perimeter to explain what we were doing. We lasted only a few minutes before being asked to leave, and we all complied. It was a very rewarding experience and I plan to keep updated on their activities in the area. The people involved were very kind and I felt like I was part of something bigger. I left that event feeling like I had at least brought some more of the spotlight to the mining issue. I made a sign that said, The iron would leave Penokee, but the damage will not! You can find more information about the movement at their website-http://idlenomore.ca/

Sytsma has for years also organized the cranberry sales in the autumn, including driving over to Austin or Madison to pick up the cranberries directly from the producer. With fewer dollars coming down from the Chapter and the Sierra Club dues, fund raising and careful budgeting by the Treasurer are most critical.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU...

Our Sierra Club Group (SEGG) is a great place to meet interesting married couples like Barb Meyocks and Dennis Flath who have served us over the years on the Executive Committee in various offices and committees. Meet Barb and Dennis, two now retired Kenosha science teachers!

Barb grew up on farms in lowa and Wisconsin. Dennis lived in Escanaba, Michigan as a youngster. Barb says that her parents' loving care for all growing things in nature, taking her to gather watercress in clear flowing streams, and gathering wild berries in the edge of fields influenced her to study science. Dennis remembers working in the woods with his father as a major factor in his choice of career. Another major influence was his high school biology teacher, Mr. Franz, who had a great influence on his love for biology and enjoyment of the natural environment.

After graduating from the University of Wisconsin in Madison, Barb taught general and environmental science, chemistry and physics at Bullen Junior and Tremper High schools in Kenosha for 26 of her 34 years as a teacher. There they met, fell in love and married. Barb received an award for a study project on the Pike River and she served on the Board of Hawthorne Hollow Nature Center. She is currently working on establishment of a memorial wayside park on the Des Plaines River, honoring long time SEGG activist Jean McGraw. Barb was inducted into the Southeast Wisconsin Educators Hall of Fame in 2004. She and Dennis were our SEGG Co-Chairs in 1992: Dennis served as Vice Chair in 2004. That year they presented a program at our regular meeting on January 20th about their travels in Africa. They also enjoyed visiting countries in Central America on another trip. Dennis retired from teaching environmental science and AP biology at Tremper High School, but has been an adjunct instructor at Carthage for the past nine years. He developed the lab manual currently used for the non-major biology students.

Barb and Dennis have helped SEGG with fund raising, served on group nomination, election and political committees. They are frequent participants in our environmental book discussion group and regular attendees at third Thursday general meetings.

He will also speak about his experience as a citizen lobbyist pushing for legislative action in the Congress.

Members participated in monitoring the health of the Root and Pike Rivers at a few sites on both rivers. Participants monitor such things as dissolved oxygen, temperature, pH, water clarity, macroinvertebrates, stream flow and habitat. I love stream monitoring because it is a great way to get out and enjoy the beauty of our local rivers and streams while helping to protect them. Knowing all the data is sent to the DNR and is used in decision making for restoration and other watershed/river projects makes the hours incredibly rewarding. Southeast Gateway Sierra Club members: it is once again time for Board of Directors elections and it is very important that we vote. The Board has the responsibility and authority to oversee all the Club staff and volunteer activities, to establish the Club's conservation priorities and internal policies, and to adapt and implement our annual budget.

Sierra Club Executive Director Michael Brune says, "I hope you will take this opportunity to exercise one of the most important responsibilities of your membership and vote for the Sierra Club Board of Directors. It will take only a few moments of your time, but the impact to our organization, our mission and our planet will be far reaching."

Voting commences upon receipt of your ballot. Ballots are sent electronically and/or through the mail to qualified members when voting commences. The electronic vote requires two numbers that are registered to each member. So, it is not feasible to provide a link that will work for all individual members. It is however of great importance for all members to vote! So you are able to make an evaluation of the candidates, an online candidate forum has been developed to help members to get to know the candidates and make informed choices. How to Get Facebook to Show You SEGG's Status Updates

Are you on Facebook? If so, we hope you've already "Liked" us or will "Like" us at https://www.facebook.com/SierraClubSoutheastGatewayGroup. You can also find us by putting "Sierra Club Southeast Gateway" in the search box.

Even if you have "Liked" us, you may not see many status updates from us. We are posting, but Facebook isn't letting you see it most of the time. They have an algorithm that decides what shows up in your news feed, and it limits posts from pages you've Liked.

There are three ways to fix this:

- I. Put your cursor over the "Like" button near our name. In the drop-down menu select "New List" and create an interest list, or add us to an existing list. You'll find all of our posts in your interest list on the left side of your home page.
- 2. Put your cursor over the "Like" button near our name. In the drop-down menu select "Get Notifications". From now on, when we post, you will get a notification.
- 3. When you see something from us, or if you visit our page, "Like" what you see or comment on it. The more you interact with our page, the better the chance we will show up in your News Feed the next time. It also helps us to track which posts our Facebook fans are actually seeing. This method isn't as reliable and is best used with either the first or second method.

When you do see a post from us, please Share it! Sharing will help raise awareness about who we are and what we do, and hopefully encourage more people to connect with us.

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
